hirty-one years later, the Chicago Golf Show is still the cure for "cabin fever."

Founded in 1984, the Chicago Golf Show always has maintained a late-winter position on the city's event calendar, serving as a beacon of Spring to those starved for sun, fun, and a lower handicap.

This year, though, cabin fever has lasted longer and claimed more victims than in most other years.

As of early February, Chicago's winter of 2013-14 had already produced 60 inches of snow, 34 days of "measurable" snow, 22 days of sub-zero temperatures and four consecutive months of belownormal cold temperatures.

The denizens of our estimable "city in a garden" also have learned a new meteorological term to describe such "cold-gone-wild" madness: the Polar Vortex. Sure, it sounds like the title of one of those futuristic movies, except that the effects have been real.

This year, the Encompass Championship presented by Career Builder is the Presenting Sponsor of the Chicago Golf Show, whose antidotes to cabin fever include former PGA Champion Jeff Sluman, All-Pro kicker Robbie Gould, and NBC/Golf Channel broadcaster Mark Rolfing.

"Attendees at the 2014 Chicago Golf Show presented by the Encompass Championship will have exciting opportunities to see a terrific lineup of high-profile stars from various sports, all of whom have at least one thing in common: they love golf," said show organizer Tom Corcoran.

Sluman is the third major champion

to appear at the Chicago Golf Show since 2008, when John Daly, winner of the 1991 PGA, rocked the convention center. Former Masters champion Craig Stadler—defending champion at this year's Encompass Championship—appeared in 2012.

Sluman and Gould will meet and greet fans with Rolfing in the expansive Golf Hawaii booth area, and are scheduled to appear on the Daily Herald Golf Academy Stage. Longtime Chicago Golf Show headliner Marty Joyce also will be back on the Academy Stage with his exciting trick shot show. WGN radio morning show host Steve Cochran will join wellknown Illinois PGA pro Emil Esposito on the stage. And some of the Chicago area's top instructors, including Joe Bosco, Louis Sauer, and Dan Kochevar and others will be giving instruction there, too.

For the fifth consecutive year, everyone who attends the Chicago Golf Show is eligible to receive a free round of golf, courtesy of GolfVisions, which operates 11 courses in the Chicago area.

"It's our understanding that free golf is the perfect antidote for cabin fever," Corcoran said with a smile.

Meanwhile, the Encompass Championship will be offering half-price tickets at its booth to this year's tournament, June 16-22, at North Shore Country Club in Glenview. Sluman will be back in the field to challenge Stadler, and Gould will be playing as a celebrity for the second consecutive year.

A major reason people attend the Chicago Golf Show is to get bargainbasement prices on name-brand clubs, balls, shoes, golf bags, apparel, and more. Equipment from Titleist, TaylorMade,

Callaway, Nike, Mizuno, Adams, Tour Edge, and more is available at discounts so deep buyers can't help but leave the show with a heightened sense of self-esteem.

At the indoor Demo area, attendees can hit the latest clubs from top manufacturers, learn more about the products, and find out about getting fitted for clubs by top clubfitters onsite.

Over the course of the three-day show, some 50 Illinois PGA pros will give free one-on-one lessons on the fullswing, short game and putting.

The Illinois Junior Golf Association again will organize scavenger hunts for younger show attendees, whose search for various items will introduce them to many aspects of the show. Juniors and their parents also can find out how to join the IJGA and compete in tournaments across the area with youngsters their age.

The Chicago Golf Show also provides an opportunity for attendees to learn about domestic and international golf resort destinations. It is understood that many resorts located in warmer climates have openings now!

The Daily Herald Golf Academy Stage features top players and instructors who will help attendees learn how to hit the ball farther and straighter as well as how to sink more putts.

Another perennial fan favorite is the famous Long Putt Contest, the proceeds of which go to charity. Players pay three dollars for three balls to try to make the 85-foot putt. They usually don't, but when they do, the crowd goes wild, and the winner gets prizes.

All these fun activities serve as the perfect therapy for cabin fever.

SHORT GAME ADVISOR

've come up with countless ways to save strokes around the greens over the years. If I had to pick the most effective, I'd take the short-to-long pitch.


As the name suggests, you hit it by making a short backswing and a much longer through-swing. The combination produces extra loft and softer-landing shots, and who doesn't want that in their short game? Better yet, it gives you more-consistent yardages, because it makes you control distance with the length of your backswing, not by swinging faster or slower. Manipulating swing speed is a sure way to catch the shot fat or thin and leave it miles from the pin.

When hitting a wedge, weekend players tend to make the opposite of the short-to-long swing.

Say you're attempting a 20-yard pitch over a bunker. High-handicappers tend to take a long backswing (mostly habit from practicing full swings). But since you want to hit the ball only 20 yards, you are forced to decelerate on the downswing, which cuts your follow-through ridiculously short. You end up in a classic "long-to-short" finish and the results are not very pretty.

A short backswing gives you the confidence to properly accelerate through impact and produce a longer follow-through. Your finish makes it look like you're hitting the ball a long way, but because you paired it with a short backswing, it flew only 20 yards.

This is easy stuff, folks. The only challenge is knowing how far you're taking the club back, because your eyes are focused on the ball, not your backswing. So have a buddy watch you. Ask him to compare the length of your backswing to the length of your through-swing, and check that the former is shorter than the latter. A simple "yes" or "no" will do. If you don't get this right, you'll struggle, which is why most Tour players ask their caddies to watch them hit balls on the range. Even for elite players, the difference between feel and real can be massive. Nothing accelerates improvement like good feedback. In terms of hitting less-than-full-swing wedges, you may be wondering, "Should I ever swing long to short?" Yes-when the ball is buried in a bunker. Stay tuned. We'll talk about that in another lesson.


The greatest compliment you can pay to any collegiate coach is that they have made a "name" for their program. Coaches like John Wooden, Pat Summitt, and Kelly Amonte-Hiller of Northwestern Women's Lacrosse are all giants in their fields and one truly feels that the way Fletcher is recruiting and leading her squads, her name might one day join the likes of those big name coaches. The facts tell the story —Northwestern has qualified for four straight NCAA Regionals. In the 2010-11 season, she was named Big Ten Co-Coach of the Year, the first Wildcat head coach to ever receive such an honor. She also earned Big Ten Coach of the Year honors in 2013 after leading Northwestern to a tie of its first Big Ten title ever in the program's history.

Last year, the Wildcats made their fourth consecutive NCAA appearance under Fletcher's tutelage, playing at the NCAA East Regional and on the final day jumped from 10th place to 6th carding a team total 4-under 284 thus qualifying for the NCAA Championships for only the second time in Wildcat women's golf history. The Cats finished 15th at the NCAA's Championship, outplaying four teams ranked in the nation's top 20.

Add Kettlebells To Your Workout

inter has delivered an especially brutal blow this year and, unless you are traveling, golf is several months away. However, now is the time to prepare your body for the perfect drive with the brand new driver that is waiting patiently in your golf bag. Whether that involves using the gym membership you purchased after the New Year or exercising at home, consider adding kettlebells to your exercise routine.

Kettlebells have been used for centuries and typically have a handle that is attached to a weight. The shape and weight distribution of the kettlebell allows a golfer to emphasize muscles in a different way than dumbbells. Many traditional exercises can be modified to enhance a golfer's game. Kettlebells have a wide range of weight, varying from a few pounds to over 100 pounds, but for most people weight ranging from 5 pounds to 20 pounds will meet most of their exercise needs.

A squat with a diagonal overhead lift utilizes muscles throughout the body and addresses the golf swing by moving in multiple planes, stressing the core, shoulders, and grip. The exercise starts with the kettlebell at the side of the right foot. Squat and reach your hands to the right while maintaining a neutral position of the spine and your knees in line with the toes (figure 1). Lift the weight by using your legs and trunk muscle, and in one fluid motion lift the kettlebell overhead and to the left as if you were placing it on a shelf (figure 2). Keep the kettlebell parallel to your forearms during the movement to strengthen your grip. Once you have fully extended overhead, return the weight to the starting position, reversing your motion. Then repeat to the opposite direction.

Squatting with a shoulder shrug is also a full body exercise that emphasizes the legs and shoulder muscles. Start the exercise with the kettlebell between your legs. Squat down with the knees over the toes while maintaining a neutral spine and grab the kettlebell. Next, lift up with the legs and at the same time lift your hands to your chin, keeping the elbows up and out to the side (figure 3). Then return to the starting position while maintaining good posture and lifting mechanics. Challenge

your shoulder and forearm muscles further by lifting the weight up to shoulder height with your arms straight (figure 4).

Both of these exercises will strengthen the muscles that drive the club head through impact. Generating power during weight shift and trunk rotation will pay huge dividends to your drives and accuracy with your irons. Using lighter weights will allow you to perform 15 to 20 repetitions and prepare you for the endurance to produce a repetitive swing for an 18-hole round.

Elevated Experiences: Lake Tahoe Golf

rom the Comstock Lode to the 1960 Winter Olympics to the PGA Tour's Reno-Tahoe Open, the Lake Tahoe Basin has been a treasure trove for outdoor enthusiasts. With majestic, snow-draped peaks and towering, scented ponderosa pines, the region is a sensory overload for Midwesterners. If smart phones distract drivers in Illinois, then the panorama around Lake Tahoe could send drivers of rental cars to a neck-cracker as they crane left and right to take in the visual wonder that lies between the Carson Range and Sierra Nevada Mountains.



Lake Tahoe is our country's largest alpine lake, and it is only second to Oregon's Crater Lake in depth. Yet, the communities that surround Lake Tahoe are second to none in activity options. Metropolitan dwellers should set their GPS systems to Truckee, Donner, or Tahoe as soon as their clubs roll off the baggage claim. These alpine towns are worlds away from the urban pound of Chicago, and an equal contrast to life in suburbia. "Earthy and organic" meet "laid-back Sierra highs" is a synthesis of the local scene. Most travelers from Chicago will fly into Reno, a cozier and

lovelier Las Vegas in the foothills of the mountains. After arriving in Reno, it becomes decision time as to on which side of the lake you'll begin your ponderosa playground retreat. About twothirds of the Lake Tahoe Basin is on the California side, while the remaining third fronts Nevada's Carson Range. Both states flank a clear, mountainfed lake that has become a four-season playground. This destination should not be tackled in a whirlwind stop-n-pop from course to course. Each course is suited for multiple plays and this approach will leave a lasting impression. The biggest crime when golfing the Reno/Tahoe area is to jam an intimate experience into a hustle from course to course. Even Ben Hogan advised golfers to stop and smell the flowers.

Lake Tahoe

The newly renovated Resorts at Squaw Creek (squawcreek.com) sit at the base of Olympic Valley, site of the 1960 Winter Olympics, and an ideal starting point for your Tahoe golf tour. The golf course is links in style, yet this Robert Trent Jones Jr. track is tight and requires precision. Without the breathtaking surroundings, golf at Squaw Creek is a wetlands experience. Humbly, the course plays second fiddle to her panorama, yet provides more than enough character to entice players to push their dinner reservations back for another loop before sunset.

The site of the American Century Championship—a celebrity gala on a championship course—has the most dramatic views of Lake Tahoe. Edgewood Tahoe (edgewoodtahoe.com) is a 7,555yard George Fazio-designed treasure that epitomizes alpine golf. Tom Fazio upgraded his father's 1960s design and preserved the experience for future generations. With sneaky doglegs and elevated greens, Edgewood Tahoe is manageable for all golfers, yet a strategic journey for players looking to best old man par. The lake is featured on 14 holes, so bring a camera because this course could fill a 12-month calendar with awe-inspiring images that do not require Photoshop.

Truckee

Truckee is just 15 minutes from Tahoe, so Tahoe Donner Resort (tahoedonner. com) is in the wheelhouse of must play courses in the area. This alpine layout is challenging and thrilling. The course received a complete bunker renovation project a few years ago. The results were a facelift that brought new life to the property which now competes with the peaks for your attention. The resort's clubhouse also received a complete

remodel. Ed Leinenkugel, director of golf, has a real gemstone under his wing. Leinenkugel, grandson of legendary Wisconsin brewmaster Jake Leinenkugel, is quick to share his enthusiasm over the changes. "This is how Tahoe Donner was meant to be played," he says. "The renovations are complete and we are excited to show golfers just how good this golf course is." Good? Tahoe Donner was my favorite day on the alpine green. While the course is narrow, it is enchanting with unique green complexes that shine with gorgeous bunkering.

At 6,300 feet above sea level, Coyote Moon Golf Course (coyotemoongolf.com) is a journey in isolation. The property is free of home sites and manmade distractions. Golfing at Coyote Moon in the Sierra Nevadas surrounds your foursome with ponderosa pines, granite bluffs, and the peaks of mountain ridges. Set on 250 acres, each hole will leave you howling with delight as each challenge cascades over ridges and into valleys.

Jack Nicklaus' design at Old Greenwood (oldgreenwood.com) opened its fairways 10 years ago. The 7,528-yard course is a more traditional design than most or his recent creations. The club has a nostalgic feel and Golden Age charm. The bunkering and green complexes are more subtle than most designs that have Jack's name on the scorecard. With the exception of one throwaway par 3, Old Greenwood is gentle and esthetically appropriate. While some golf architecture aficionados balk at anything by Nicklaus, Old Greenwood is a treat.

Formally known as Timilick Lake Tahoe, Schaffer's Mill Golf Club (schaffersmill.com) opened in 2008 and offers serious elevation changes on her Mountain Nine. Those views include the Martis Valley, Lookout Mountain, and the Carson Range. The views on the Meadow Nine are fantastic, but the Mountain is a case study in extremes with elevation changes of over 400 feet.

Designed by Johnny Miller and John Harbottle, the 6,982-yard, par 71 track is the best of both worlds in Truckee.

I am pretty sure a golf car cannot out pace a grizzly bear. And while playing the brilliant Bob Cupp design at Grizzly Ranch Golf Club (grizzlybeargolfclub. com) I only hoped that the huge beast would at least let me finish my round before taking chase for dinner. Grizzly Ranch is another experience in isolation. The heroic layout, much like its namesake, requires power and skill to defeat it. Hole 12 is a three shooter like none other. An elevated green is visable throughout the hole, yet is seems like an impossible journey to reach it. The club is in Portola, 45 minutes from Tahoe, and home to the aforementioned bears, mountain cats, and deer. I did see a few deer and an eagle, but thankfully, no bears had to play through.

There are very few golf courses that stir something inside me that says, "I'll never tire of playing here. Everything make sense." I had that feeling during the front nine of my round at Whitehawk Ranch Golf Club. Located 40 miles from Truckee, Whitehawk Ranch (golfwhitehawk. com) is a pristine layout that blends meadows with forests and golf holes seem to appear where the pine, cedar, and aspen trees steer the mowers. While the first few holes of the back nine are challenging, these holes are not as special as the front nine.

Although the charms of the Sierra Nevada Mountains may have been lost on Springfield's Donner Party, if you are teetering on planning your Tahoe vacation, remember that there are 300+ days of sunshine. Even a gambler on a Reno blackjack table doesn't get those odds for a successful trip.

The landscapes that surround our communities define us. Whether cornfield, mountain, desert, forest, or seaside, we are shaped by what we see and where we drive. Trees, mountains, and wetlands are integrated into the panorama of our lives. River town, bayou, farm town, mountain hamlet, coastal village, or cottage country all evoke an image of life in a community.

The existence of a golf course shapes our communities. The character and aesthetic of a golf course is borne from unique characteristics of the setting and the surrounding landscape. Creeks, rivers, trees, valleys, floodplains, and hilltops converge to create the foundation of a unique golf experience. Sometimes, golf is created on "pancake" sites, parcels of land with minimal landscape character, but provide an enhanced recreational outlet. Golf courses, whether public or private, exist in those environments in ways that are constructive and unique, exposing rich landscapes, either subtle or dramatic.

Public golf has the unique opportunity to fulfill a variety of community needs. Whether water quality, stormwater management, preservation, or landscape enhancement, golf courses are flexible enough to work with these demands in ways that will offer results to communities seeking win-win solutions. Golf can serve as a buffer to sensitive wetlands, watersheds, and creek corridors. Golf courses can help stabilize landfills and mined sites. These degraded sites can morph into safe, recreation green space. If designed properly, golf courses will improve water quality, stormwater management, and create wildlife habitat. Not only does public golf have the opportunity to accomplish so much, it has a responsibility to do so.

Golf can offer cultural solutions by providing an alternative to inactive children, an outlet for seniors, and stimulus for the handicapped. More and more, golf course architects are developing unique alternative courses to provide easier access for novice and disadvantaged golfers. These courses transform communities by providing a desired "third place" - that destination beyond home, work, or school.

Golf is more than a game; it is a sport played in, around, and amongst the most beautiful and precious resources on earth. If developed properly, golf can preserve those resources while providing controlled and specific access to those environments. Every year we witness the splendor of the Monterey Peninsula; golf allows us to visit

the hill country of Texas, the dunes of the Carolina coast, the pure links of Scotland, the oak-hickory parklands of the Midwest, and acres of arroyo in the desert. We are enriched and enlightened because of these encounters. The same happens every day in our hometowns, yet on a smaller, more intimate scale.

Golf courses are places that enrich communities, but only if they are conceived to do so. Golf can be private, but it can be perceived as "public," in the broadest sense of the word. It can enrich communities; it can better lives; it can expose and protect landscapes; and mostly it can become part of the fabric that defines who we are and where we live.

Homer Glen's Woodbine G.C. Purchased by Village

The southwest suburban village of Homer Glen purchased the popular Woodbine Golf Course in December and will transition the property into parkland in 2015. The village paid \$3.3 million for the privately-held 102-acre property which was owned by Jim and Patricia Ludwig. This was considered a bargain price as the course had been appraised at more than \$6 million only four years ago.

The deal had been approved during a special meeting held by village officials on December 23rd with the closing performed on December 30th. While a 2009 village meeting showed opposition by residents to such a deal, village officials saw an opportunity to purchase prime real estate in the center of Homer Glen for use as a village hall, a senior center and the community's first major park.

Designed by Gordon Cunningham and opened in 1988, the 6,020-yard layout features bent grass fairways, tees and greens. The course will continue operations through the 2014 season while the village honors previously contracted outings, wedding receptions, and events.

KemperSports To Manage Two Major Area Properties

Northbrook-based sports management company KemperSports has been contracted to manage two Chicagoland properties—the private Bull Valley Golf Club in Woodstock, and the acclaimed Cantigny Golf complex in Wheaton.

Bull Valley G.C. was designed by Dick Nugent and opened in 1988. It was the 2010 site of both the Chicago District Golf Association's Amateur Championship and the U.S. Open Qualifier. The club also includes a 37.000 sq. ft. clubhouse.

Widely recognized as one of Chicagoland's premier golf properties, Cantigny Golf

in January became the 16th state golf property to be managed by KemperSports. The property features three 9-hole championship courses along with the 9-hole Cantigny Youth Links and the acclaimed Cantigny Golf Academy. KemperSports will be responsible for management of all golf and hospitality operations with current Cantigny staff in these areas becoming KemperSports staff. The transition was scheduled to take place in mid-February.

Since the course opened in 1989, Cantigny Golf has engaged more than 800 local students in its caddies program with nine selected as recipients of Evans Scholarships.

Golden Bear, WGA Team Up To Assist **Evans Scholars**

One of golf's premier champions visited Chicago recently and left after raising almost \$1 million earmarked for scholarships to deserving area



caddies. Some 350 golf enthusiasts attending the WGA's third annual Green Coat Gala in downtown Chicago were treated to an interview with Jack Nicklaus by two-time U.S. Open champion Andy North. Winner of 18 major championships, Nicklaus was inducted into the WGA's Caddie Hall of Fame by WGA President and CEO John Kackowski during the event.

Golf Course Closings Continue to Outpace Openings

For the eighth consecutive year, golf course closings across the U.S. exceeded course openings, according to the National Golf Foundation. The foundation figures for 2013 showed that 157 courses were shuttered while only 14 courses were unveiled. Only six of the closed courses were private, while 66% were lower-priced facilities that averaged green fees of under \$40 per round. Since 2006, 643 golf courses across the country have ceased operations.

Performance Golf Center Opens in Lincoln Park Area

A 7,500 sq. ft. golf fitness and performance center has opened in Chicago's Lincoln Park area. 

Watson Harpoons A Shark

Tom Watson and Greg Norman were at the top of the golf world in 1984, the players to beat each week. In the 1984 Western Open, they were at the top of the leader board in the final round, with Watson prevailing on the third hole of a sudden-death playoff at Butler National Golf Club in Oak Brook. But before Watson sank a curling 25-footer for birdie to win his third Western, there was chaos.

The final day started with a plane crash. A single-engine plane lost power over the course as the leaders were on the first fairway, and battling gusty winds glided to a crash landing on the adjacent Oak Brook Golf Course, ending up overturned on the 14th fairway. The pilot and two passengers suffered minor injuries.

Then the madness began on the golf course. Watson didn't hit many more fairways than the pilot, but made par from the forest to the right of the third fairway, from the dead zone to the left of the 17th green, and in between, from a concession stand on the par-3 11th.




"I said, 'Geez, that's the best par I've ever seen, including the ones I made at Winged Foot,' " quoth the Shark, who had lost a playoff for the U.S. Open to Fuzzy Zoeller three weeks before.

Norman, who had beaten Jack Nicklaus in Canada the week before, had led Watson by a stroke at dawn. scored a final round 71 to Watson's 70, and nearly had a stroke after missing a 30-footer for birdie on the third playoff hole, Butler's treacherous 18th.

"I gave it my best shot," Norman said. "He was better than me." "I made everything I looked at," Watson said.

For Norman, it was his closest brush with the J.K. Wadley Trophy. He would finish second or tied for second five times, a tournament record, but never win.



Arizona's Scottsdale area has long been a preferred destination of Chicagoans looking to spend a few weeks or months away from the cold, wind, and snow. The absurdly frigid conditions of this past winter, of course, have made those among us known as "snowbirds" look downright brilliant in their decision-making. Along with the warm temperatures and blue skies, this community serves as the spring training home to three major league teams: the San Francisco Giants, the Colorado Rockies, and the Arizona Diamondbacks with other Cactus League clustered nearby.

Most important to us is the fact that Scottsdale is home to some of America's greatest golf properties. The two courses at Troon North, Grayhawk's Talon and Raptor courses, and the two courses at TPC Scottsdale are all ranked among the state's top 25 public golf layouts by *GOLF* magazine.

The 8,000-acre private community of Desert Mountain stands alone as one of America's greatest golf and recreational properties. Six golf courses designed by legendary Tour superstar and architect Jack Nicklaus stretch across the

property. "Desert Mountain has been one of the highlights of my career as a golf course designer," Nicklaus has said of the complex. "I believe it will always be recognized as one of the greatest golf clubs in the world."

Prospective members from the Chicagoland area should feel right at home on the property as 6.8% of Desert Mountain membership—136 members in total—are Illinoisans. Of that number, almost half are from the city.

It is easy to forget over time that Nicklaus basically invented desert golf in the 1980s by creating courses that preserved native saguaro cactus plants, paloverde trees, and other varieties of cacti. The dramatic effect includes forced carries over natural desert land and waste bunkers dotted with brush and natural vegetation. At Desert Mountain, golfers get to enjoy vistas of the lush Sonoran Desert on most all of the community's 108 holes. Dramatic elevation changes are a marguis attraction of the property, from the 2,700-foot Renegade Course (the first 18 built at Desert Mountain) to the 3,400foot Outlaw Course. The 7,019-yard Cochise Course should be familiar to the public as it

hosted the 2012 Champions Tour event, the Charles Schwab Championship in 2012. The course is contracted to host that tournament again this year and in 2016.

The newest golf amenity at Desert Mountain is the \$1.6 million Jim Flick Golf Performance Center. Touted for featuring the most advanced technology in the industry all in one place, the center features a wide variety of equipment to analyze and improve swings, including a 3-D motion capture, Doppler radar, and four-camera video motion analysis. While other performance centers have a putting station, the center features





a SAM PuttLab that includes an analysis and training system based upon ultrasound measurements. Think you have a bad tendency or three? The lab analyzes the 28 most

important parameters of a putting stroke and displays the results in a simple graphic report. Likewise, a Quintic Ball Roll Monitor utilizes a 260-frames-per-second high-speed

Lake Effects: Golf in The Show Me State

At Central Missouri's Lake of the Ozarks, the ease of travel is never on a sabbatical. Just a seven-hour drive from Chicagoland, this hassle-free golf getaway is loaded with unique golf courses and a cozy charm that has been a favorite retreat for Chicagoans for nearly three generations. Missouri's Lake of the Ozarks is the perfect destination for a buddy trip, or a much-needed family vacation without the flight delays and TSA pat-downs we've grown to expect from air travel.

The Lake's upscale courses offer reduced rates during early spring, and Central Missouri golfers are usually on lush turf, playing it down, by mid-March. Affordable golf and an early thaw are the perfect excuses to book a spring trip with the regular pigeons to knock the rust off a snowball season swing.

Must Play Tracks

Playing the masterful Tom Weiskopf design at Old Kinderhook for the regular rate of \$69 is one of the best deals in golf, but their early season rate of \$55 is the biggest steal in the golfing world. At 6,855 yards, this par 71 will be on your short list of top courses. Since opening in 1999, players can count on Augusta-like turf and bunker conditions and PGA Tour-ish green speeds. In addition to the best collection of par 3s at the Lake, the short par 4s at #6 and #17 are lessons in risk/reward on perfect, sporty two-shooters.

The Lodge of Four Seasons offers guests access to the exclusive Jack Nicklaus design at Porto Cima; however, The Ridge Course is one of my favorite tracks in the area. At just 6,447 yards from the tips, length off the tee is not a premium, but it does help. The resort layout has parkland and alpine elements that blend into a wonderful collection of solid golf holes nestled between Ozarks hillocks and ridges. The Ken Kavanaugh design's final hole has 13 bunkers visible from the tee. I dubbed it "Swiss Cheese" and this uphill conclusion will inspire presses from gamblers.

Tan-Tar-A's Hidden Lakes course is a sporty shot-making delight where drama steps to the forefront on each tee box. This nine-holer is the answer to extra holes before sunset and a quick early round before the family hits the outlet mall. While Hidden Lakes is no pushover, it is ideal and sporty for taking out beginners and juniors. In just nine holes, the challenges are formidable and the lake views are on par with the other courses at the lake. Tan-Tar-A Resort's The Oaks Course affords guests and visitors another one of Lake of the Ozarks' best buys. Adults can play at the spring rate of \$50 with a cart while kids can play for \$25 each; the entire clan can play a tournament quality track for less than the cost of one 300 level Chicago Bulls ticket. The Oaks presents a difficult, Carolina feel throughout the 6,432-yard layout. Director of Golf Paul Leahy shared, "If you can match your handicap at either of our courses, then I will tip my hat to you."

Osage National Golf

Leahy adds, "Poor course management and errant drives will result in humble pie and a bloated scorecard." This track demands focus and probably a replay to get your arms around it.

Osage National Golf Club offers the only 27-hole layout at The Lake. The Arnold Palmer Design Team carved three distinct loops just north of Osage Beach. Plan on spending a day out at Osage National and playing all 27 holes; multiple lines of play and some ticklish greens provide the stimulus; you bring the shots. My favorite loop is the Mountain course. With the strongest opening stretch of holes at the lake, these nine holes are a lesson in fight or flight. If your game is on, then swing out of your shoes. However, if you are still knocking the kinks off a sore back, use your head and attack the course from its elevated tees with a bogey mindset. The River Course steers golfers along the Osage River and provides dramatic views of the craggy bluffs. As the course's name suggests, water features abound at the River and a blunder is as likely as a birdie on every hole. These two courses stretch beyond 7,150 yards, so be sure to pack plenty of ammunition and prepare for a plethora of approach shots with hybrids and fairway woods.

In the heart of Osage Beach, two courses offer something for golfers of

all abilities. Dogwood Hills Golf Club is centrally located, and its villas and accommodations are perfect to meet the needs of a golfing caravan heading south. The course is a parkland style 18-hole layout that allows you to steer those carts off the cart paths anytime! While Dogwood Hills has never fancied itself as the lake's marquee course, it is a great platform to spend time with your vacationing foursome. Booking a room at Dogwood also puts travelers a short drive from Sycamore Creek Golf Club, a truly remarkable club designed, owned, and operated by the Kahrs family. And while you're there, be sure to ask about their







world-renowned fishery that is a feature on the front nine. Sycamore Creek is an experience that is unique to the lake. I recommend it to all visitors and while its doglegs and routing is quirky at times, this course is thoroughly enjoyable and extremely difficult. You'll talk about this track long after your trek back to Illinois!

Saying "Central Missouri's Lake of the Ozarks Golf Trail," is a mouthful, but it is a destination that should make your short list of early spring golf options this season. Elegant Design and Tour Success Define Bettinardi Golf

Before I pulled into the parking lot of Bettinardi Golf's world headquarters in Tinley Park, I was fully aware of the passionate following of the company's product line. Cases in point:

A close friend had experienced the misfortune of a garage break-in. The perpetrators walked away with a number of valuable possessions, including the fellow's golf bag. "I was ready to replace the irons and woods,

anyway," the victim said in attempting to reconcile his fate. "But I wish those idiots would have at least had the decency to leave behind my Bettinardi putter," he sighed.

Five years ago, I was driving across the southwest suburbs of Chicago with a business associate who, as he studied an area map, suddenly directed me to make a series of turns onto a street alongside I-80. "Where are we?" I asked. The associate directed me inside the lobby of the machine shop from where his beloved Bettinardi putter had been produced. The fellow walked about the atrium and studied the artifacts and plaques on the walls that celebrated the championships won by Tour players who earned their titles using the company's putters. "Now what do we do?" I asked. The fellow asked the receptionist if he could say a few words to a company staff member. Someone appeared from a side office and my friend shook his hand in gratitude for producing his favorite club in his golf bag.

I was on the first hole of a city golf course one Saturday a few summers ago. When my playing partners and I got to the green, I noticed that one of the guys had made a dramatic equipment change. "You got rid of your custom-made putter?" I asked, slightly astonished. He gave me a sheepish green. "Nope," he replied. "Since I was unfamiliar with this course, I didn't want to risk the chance that someone would run away with my Bettinardi putter."

I relayed a few of these stories to owner Bob Bettinardi on a frigid day in February and he greeted each with a laugh. "We don't make putters," he says. "We make fine jewelry." This assessment seems like overstatement until one holds a hand-crafted, custom-fitted Bettinardi putter in his or her hands. Set aside for a moment the engineering that went into the design and disregard the 20 points of inspection that goes into the quality assurance of the finished product. Appreciate, instead, the golf club as a piece of art. "It is artwork!"







says Bettinardi, reflecting on this assessment. "And we've come to an important conclusion: that golfers—whether Tour pros or players new to the game—will make more putts if they have confidence in their putters. And to have that confidence," he adds, "they have to like what they see when standing over the ball."

As the company owner speaks, a cabinet a few paces from the couches in Studio B—the company's club-fitting area—affirms the many reasons why Bettinardi putter owners should trust their equipment. The cabinet holds gold-plated replicas of the putters used by Tour players en route to their victories. Most prominent in the display is the model used by Tour star Matt Kuchar in his two 2013 victories at the Memorial Tournament and the Accenture Match Play Championship.

While a Bettinardi Golf customer can purchase the exact model Kuchar carries in his bag, such a decision would miss the point explains Studio B general manager Mike Orvis. "I've personally performed over 700 fittings," he says, "and I've seen over 700 different putting strokes during those fittings." The putting stroke, it turns out, is as unique as a snowflake. The purpose of a custom fitting is to construct a putter based upon a player's height, address position, eye line, hand size, stroke length, and stroke angle, and adapt those to putter-head preference. Orvis uses a state-of-the-art V1 Pro four-camera laser fitting system to perform the analysis. "We fit the person to the putter," he says. "Our clients leave Studio B with a putter suited precisely to their tendencies."

Orvis walked with me across the machine shop where every Bettinardi putter is manufactured. "It all begins right here," he says, pointing to a stack of carbon steel beams-100% U.S.-produced as are all components of a Bettinardi Golf product. The beams get cut into sections before they are precision-milled by CMC equipment. From there, each putter head is refined by hand until it meets each of over a dozen specification points. Those that don't are set aside for scrap.

A walk upstairs above the machine shop reveals a rack of finished Bettinardi putters, no more than 300 in total. "That's our entire worldwide inventory," Orvis marvels. Next to that rack is a table of ball markers, belt buckles, and ball repair tools all hand-painted and each emblazoned with the signature Bettinardi honeycomb logo. "Players of Bettinardi Golf equipment like to promote our brand," Orvis notes.

Back in Studio B, Bob Bettinardi relates the origins of Bettinardi Golf. "I'm an industrial engineer and I'm a golfer," he says. "I walked into a pro shop back in 1991 and picked up a putter that said 'milled' on it. "I could see immediately that it was made using an older technology." It took six months of research and development—much through "trial and error" says the owner—before the first prototype was ready in 1993. Six years later, Jesper Parnevik needed only 99 putts over 72 holes to win the Greater Greensboro Open using a Bettinardi putter. In 2000, Phil Michelson shot a 63 on his final round to win at Colonial using a Bettinardi putter. In 2003, Jim Furyk won the U.S. Open at Olympia Fields using a you-know-what.





Today, Kuchar and Brian Gay are both under contract as Bettinardi Tour Staff members. Kuchar putts with a Kuchar Model 1 Arm Lock putter using his distinctive style that earned him \$5.6 million on the Tour in 2013. Gay uses a prototype model known as the "BB8" which placed him third on the tour in 3-putt avoidance last season.

"We like to think of our putters as elegant and beautiful," Bettinardi says. "If they look good to your eye and they feel good, you are bound to become a better putter."

Along with its manufacturing, distribution, and custom-fitting headquarters in Tinley Park, Bettinardi Golf has custom-fitting studios in Minnesota and at the Country Club of the South in Georgia. Turn Your Game Around


"he most common thing I hear on the driving range on a day to day basis is you have to turn more. Now don't get me wrong; turn in the golf swing is very important. I will always ask my students when they are trying to turn more these questions: Turn what? Turn how much? Turn when? These are all very important questions. Most students I see don't turn their shoulders and hips enough on the backswing. Generally they tend to slide their hips away from the target, which inhibits their shoulders from turning. The ideal turn for the shoulders should be around 90 degrees, depending on your flexibility. In order for that to happen for most people the hips would then need to turn around 45 degrees. If you are someone who is struggling with turn on the backswing here are a couple tips to facilitate that. The first tip would be making sure your shoulders are parallel to your foot line. Put a club on the ground parallel to your foot line, this will also help encourage you to aim correctly. Then put a club parallel and across your shoulders and make sure it is parallel to the club on the ground. If the shoulders are open 10 degrees at address then that is 10 more degrees you have to turn on your backswing, just to get back to acceptable turn. The second tip would be turning the toe of your trail foot out away from the target, or clockwise. This will help free up your right hip joint and allow the hips and shoulders to turn more freely.

Now that we have the backswing in a perfect position what is the next move.?Well most students I ask this question to say "rotate or turn." It is very important to rotate on the downswing; we just have to make sure it happens in the correct sequence. The first move to start the downswing should be a lateral move of the lower body towards the target. To give you a clear vision, at the top of the swing your belt buckle should be pointed behind the golf ball. As you start the downswing I want you to shift your weight to your forward foot while keeping that belt buckle behind the ball for a brief instant. If you make this move correctly it will help make the club swing down on the correct plane. Once the shift has been made to the front foot and the shoulders and belt buckle have remained pointed behind the ball, now you can turn. This is a power move that most great players make. So yes, they do turn and rotate on the downswing, but it's done in the right sequence. Those of you who are turning your shoulders and hips too soon to start the downswing are probably hitting some big slices and maybe pulls.

So remember: most average golfer's slide their hips back on the backswing and turn their hips to start the downswing, while most good players turn their hips on the backswing and slide their lower body a little to start their downswing. These couple thoughts, if performed correctly, can start to turn your game around.


The Art Of Fast Play: Solving Golf's Maddening Problem of Slow Play By Sam Dunn 123 Pages \$14.95 www.vineyardstories.com

t is a traffic jam. No air is moving. An entire legion has been reduced to texting and updating their facebook status while behind the wheel of their rental car. While this scene does occur during rush hour in the Loop, it is more annoying when you are waiting on a par 3 and the sun is setting. Pace of play is golf's dirty secret. It is always the group in front of you. It is always someone else's fault.

Pace of play is golf's biggest problem. Time is a luxury and the footprint of a round of golf can stomp out a weekend. In a perfect world, author Sam Dunn's The Art Of Fast Play will out sell Ben Hogan and Harvey Penick. In a golfer's utopia, Dunn would be guoted like Lee Trevino on every first tee. Sam Dunn's advice to hit the damn ball and move could ensnare occasional golfers to play more rounds.

"Playing in four hours isn't about hurrying; it's simply not wasting time. An efficient round requires awareness and teamwork," shared Dunn. The Art Of Fast Play is a lesson in the obvious, yet these simple routines are often the exception on many courses. Let's face it, most rangers are paper dragons to the sloths who plumb bob their four-footer for a quad-bogey and walk off yardage after they just chunked their fourth shot. Dunn's lessons stress leadership and awareness, not to mention when you should do your housekeeping and how it is never acceptable to leave the golf car without a couple clubs.

I hope that *The Art Of Fast Play* will send vibrations across our golfing nation like Paine's Common Sense; then we may have time to squeeze our lives in...in between rounds.



ey, man, check out this gnarly wine. Gnarly Head wine, actually. Starting from San Francisco, go about 100 miles east and a bit north and you'll reach Lodi, California, home of Gnarly Head Winery. And, where does that unusual name

come from?

In 2005, the founders of Gnarly Head went in search of a vineyard suitable for making the Zinfandel they dreamed of. They found it in Lodi, when they came upon some of the oldest vines in California. Old vines are also known as heritage vines, old world vines, and most importantly gnarly vines. The 30- to 80-year-old vines have twisted, old trunks and branches sprouting in all directions—truly gnarly heads. The free- standing mop-topped 'head trained' vines found in these old vineyards were the nursery for Gnarly Head Old Zinfandel. Grapes from these old vines are small and few, but offer the big flavor the winemakers were looking for.

Since 2005, the winery has expanded to include a total of nine selections in the house style, including the original Zinfandel, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Pinot Noir, a red blend and a white blend. 2012 Chardonnay \$10

If you are not a big fan of Chardonnay, especially in the oaky style, this could be the one for you. Gnarly Chard is almost colorless in the glass, it is so pale. The nose features suggestions of melon and pineapple.

These flavors continue on the palate, which also adds pear, plenty of citrus, and a touch of vanilla on the finish. It's much like a Pinot Grigio, although Gnarly Head makes one of those, as well. The 2012 Gnarly Head Chardonnay is crafted using grapes from specially selected vineyards in Lodi and Monterey.

Spring may seem impossibly far away now, but it will be here before we know it. When it does arrive, have this wine ready to pair with Tuna au Poivre, Sea Bass with Olives and Roast Tomatoes, or Poached Chicken with Avgolemono Sauce. 2012 Malbec \$12

Altough based in California, Gnarly Head isn't afraid to travel the world in search of wines that match their product philosophy, in this case down Argentina way. Famous as the epicenter of Malbec, Mendoza abuts the eastern foothills of the Andes, 220 winding miles from Santiago, Chile.

The vineyards of Mendoza are some of the highest in the world. The difficult sandy soils there stress the vines, leading to concentrated juice.

This 2012 is Gnarly Head's inaugural Malbec offering. The deep-purple color in the glass follows on with aromas of dark berry fruits. The fruit character was preserved by aging the wine for six months in split lots, some in oak and some in stainless steel to restrain the tannins (but not too much). Finishes with plenty of blueberry and blackberry.

Enjoy this value wine with Aegean Lamb Casserole with Pasta, Beef Tangine with Prunes, or Herb Braised Rabbit.

The Best To Never... The Major-less Debate Continues

FROM THE FRINGE Insights on the **PGA** Tour

When the gates to Magnolia Lane open and play-ers begin filing into Augusta National for The Masters the week of April 7th, the PGA Tour season will be exactly six months old and 26 tournaments deep. The thought of it is slightly nauseating, actually, considering there are another five months and 24 tournaments after someone slips on the green jacket. The Masters, the middle of the golf season—who'da thunk it?

The first major, which many in the Midwest consider the start of the golf season, is now actually a better barometer for those participating in the age-old debate of "who is the best player to have not won a major."

That argument has become more "inside golf" than ever after Phil Mickelson finally got over the hump in the 2004 Masters at the age of 34. Since then you could make an argument about a variety of guys being "the best" to not have a major, but no one really moved the needle among casual fans like Mickelson had.

Since the dawn of the Tiger Woods era at the 1997 Masters, 35 different men have claimed their first major championship. That means 51 percent of the time—including Woods' historic win in '97—a player captures his first major. Keeping with that percentage, of the world's top 30 golfers, half already have a major championship. Six of the top seven already have their jacket, or trophy. So that means the "best to have never won" list is pretty thin heading into major tournament season in 2014.

Is this more fun, or less exciting? Do we have fewer career grinders to root for? Or do we find ourselves hoping that more "young phenoms" actually prove to be just that? Really, we're just left with a bunch of 30-somethings who are probably due, but aren't exciting to watch or don't inspire great passion from the casual fan. Heck, some of these guys even put golf aficionados to sleep.

The "best to never win a major" speaks to golf's parity now, and Woods' recent inability to harness his putter when it matters most. It also means we should change our criteria for debating this topic, especially since the game has changed so much since Woods' first major victory in 1997.

I mean, of course Steve Stricker (12 PGA Tour wins) and Lee Westwood (39 professional wins) are the "best players to have never won" a major in their careers.

But are they the best players now? No.

That's not to say they can't win a major or that they won't. I just feel they've aged out of the discussion. I

mean, even Ernie Els winning at 42 and Mickelson winning at 43 are oddities—and those guys have done it before. To get your first one in your 40s? It can be done, but you're no longer the best of anything for more than four days at a time.

So, to determine my list of the "best of who haven't won," I began by eliminating anyone who will be 38 or older when the Masters begins. Since '97, only Darren Clarke (42) and Mark O'Meara (41) captured their first major at an older age. You can make a lot of money until you're 50 on the PGA Tour, but it's really hard to win a major at the back end of your 30s.

In fact, only seven players have won their first major at 35 or older since 1997.

Then, I dismissed any player 24 or younger. It's incredibly rare to win a first major at that age. Only Woods (21) and Rory McIlroy (22) have done that since '97.

So, 25 seems to be the opening of the major window, with it closing at 34. Justin Leonard, Martin Kaymer, and Keegan Bradley all broke through at 25. David Toms, Shaun Micheel, and Mickelson all won their first at 34. It makes sense. That decade between 25 and 34 is your prime, when you should be playing at your highest level, the "best" level.

So, that's the group of players I started looking at. That narrows the list. Of the world's top 50 players, only 17 fit that category. Then, I looked at their careers, and their impact in the game. Sorry, Gonzalo Fdez-Castano, Graham Delaet, Branden Grace, and Chris Kirk, you just haven't done enough. And there are plenty of guys like you, too.

So that made the list really, really easy. Dustin Johnson Jason Day

Brandt	Snedeker
Hunter	Mahan

If you want to be generous, you could include Ryan Moore and Nick Watney. (I really can't say Sergio Garcia. He'll be 34 at the Masters, but he's just so damaged. You'll be able to knock me over with a feather if he ever wins one.)

That's it. Right now, heading into the Masters Tournament of 2014, they are the best players to have not won a major.

The sextet has 25 combined PGA Tour wins, and has made noise nationally and globally. Johnson, Day, and Mahan have six top 10s in majors. Snedeker has five, Moore and Watney have two each.

So what does it mean? That's the fun part of the debate, isn't it?


