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

## The Dreaded "S" Word

The shanks: I know we all try to avoid even talking about it but it's a topic that needs to be addressed. Throughout the summer I get golfers coming up to me saying they are going to give up the game of golf because of the shanks. I know it's frustrating and at times debilitating, but if you know what causes it out on the course, the shanks can easily be fixed and possibly prevented. In this article I'm going to talk about what causes the shanks and a few drills you can use and practice with to help

Let's start out with what causes the shanks to happen. As one of the pro's at Arrowhead Golf Club in Wheaton, I provide short game lessons to anyone who is struggling with the shanks. I can see that they are standing too close to the golf ball and their weight and club are swinging more towards the ball. Picture the club path coming over the top and swinging across their body. When this happens, that path exposes the hosel of the club which leads to the dreaded shank. Hitting the ball on

the hosel is one of the worst feelings you can have as a golfer as it puts fear and second guessing in your head throughout the rest of the game. When this happens the first instinct you have is that you need to stand closer to the golf ball as this gives you more control over your club, but in fact this is like putting gas on the fire.

When you catch a case of the shanks on the course you can do a few things to help fix the problem. Start by taking your normal set up, but rather than aligning the golf ball up in the center of the club face, let's address your ball on the hosel of your club and try to strike the golf ball on the toe of the club. This teaches our brain and body to start working away from the golf ball and working the club more towards our body. This is a quick fix during your round to help stop the dreaded shank.

Once the round is complete it wouldn't be a bad idea to hit the range and get in some practice to make sure the shanks are few and far between during your next round of golf. A drill I like to use to teach

my hands to work away from the ball and more towards my body requires two golf balls and full swings. Take two golf balls about a club head's width apart and address the golf ball that is the farthest away. In the down swing, you are going to hit the golf ball that is closest to you. This drill helps you bring your hands in at impact and keeping your weight from moving closer to the golf ball. Practice this drill with a bucket of balls or two and your shanks should go back into hiding.

The shanks are like a common cold. they show up out of nowhere but with a little TLC on the range you shouldn't have to worry about those dreaded shanks any longer. Give these few drills a try and remember it's best to see your local PGA professional with any questions you might have rather than trying to fix the issue yourself. Looking forward to seeing you all on the course!

## Rancho Mañana Golf Club & Spa

Rancho Mañana Golf Club, located in the high Sonoran Desert in historic Cave Creek, Arizona, boasts some of the state's most breathtaking views and challenging holes of golf. From the first hole, the front nine takes golfers through the Town of Cave Creek's name sake, Cave Creek Wash, one of the last remaining riparian areas in the state. Nowhere else in the Valley of the Sun can a golfer simultaneously view picturesque images of Camelback Mountain, Mummy Mountain, Squaw

Golfers then begin to meander back towards the site of a once-thriving western dude ranch — now the clubhouse and restaurant facilities, with their original, rustic structures. From there, Rancho Mañana's back nine allows one to encounter a slightly different experience, as golfers work their way around a lush oasis of water-guarded holes with 360 degrees of unobstructed mountain views, where Mother Nature's vast array of wildlife can be found, including the likes of bobcats, roadrunners, rabbits, and mule deer.

Although the par-70 layout features dramatic elevation changes and acres of unspoiled desert terrain, Rancho Mañana is well known for its fairness and playability for golfers of all abilities. Built in the late 1980s, the course has had time to mature. and a few key renovations throughout its history have improved it with age. The recently renovated bunkers provide just the right amount of challenge without creating undue stress caused by shoul-

der-deep traps sometimes encountered in the game.

It's easy to see why the course has won so many accolades, including making the list of "America's Top 50 Courses for Women" by Golf Digest in 2010. Most holes don't have extensively long forced carries from the tees, and the same is true for nearly all the greens that are accepting of low-bouncing shots hit short of the green. The course was also selected as being in the top 10 courses in Arizona by Ranking Arizona magazine during the same year.

The 19th hole is usually of equal importance to the golf course itself for any golf experience, and the Tonto Bar and Grill is only a few short steps away and captures the rustic desert ambiance of years gone by with hand-carved beams of the historic ranch ceiling still in place. With two dining areas inside and a covered patio overlooking the 11th green, the facility certainly provides a cozy spot to relax after an enjoyable day on the links.

In addition to offering cold beverages, great care is taken to ensure the menu is second to none and that it fully embraces the local flavors of the southwest. Chef Eric Flatt and his staff also aim to preserve Arizona's heritage through cuisine and by sharing the stories of the property's past. They fuse Southwestern and Native American ingredients and present them in a warm, welcoming atmosphere rich in Arizona lore. Many areas of the restaurant feature historic photos of the property from the years as one of Arizona's most successful dude ranches in the 1940s.

The restaurant has also received numerous awards and accolades, including being honored by PHOENIX magazine in their list of the valley's Top 100 Restaurants, and a continuous honor from Wine Spectator magazine due to the extensive wine selections that are available.

ists of the top golf courses in the world are top heavy with seaside experiences. Monterey's Pebble Beach Golf Links rests along the Pacific Ocean as does Bandon Dunes in Oregon. Royal County Down is on the Irish Sea. Scotland's Royal Dornoch is on the North Sea.

While oceans and seas obviously help make for great golf and breathtaking scenery, I personally can't imagine a more spectacular setting for golf than the Canadian Rocky Mountains near Alberta. A combination of crystal blue skies with mountain peaks soaring some 3,000 feet above tees and greens provide an exhilarating golf high unique to this part of the world.

A good portion of the fun in making the trip to Banff Springs is the sheer anticipation of one's arrival in the mountains. Calgary International Airport is three hours north of the U.S.-Canadian border and only a 90-minute drive east of Banff National Park. A short jaunt through the city gets one out into the country and eventually onto Highway 1, also known as the Trans-Canada Highway. The ride past Heart Mountain leads toward Pigeon Mountain before you head northwest at Dead Man's Flats. Just short of Mount Rundle, you reach the entrance gates of Banff National Park.

From its humble beginnings as a 26-square mile hot springs preserve, Banff National Park has expanded a hundredfold into 2,564 square miles (6,641 square kilometers) of stunning mountain scenery located in the heart of the Canadian Rockies. The park is literally a celebration of nature, featuring snow-capped peaks, glistening glaciers and awe-inspiring landscapes. Millions of tourists visit annually to gawk at the emerald waters of Lake Louise, to stroll through the flower-filled fields at Sunshine Meadows, and to cruise beneath the jagged peaks lining the Icefields Parkway.

Readers of this magazine, of course, know the most enjoyable way to commune with nature involves a bag of clubs and a cooler of refreshing beverages. To accommodate that yearning, the national park offers no less than 11 golf courses across the area, including a number of spectacular championship layouts reviewed here.

#### **Fairmont Banff Springs**

Way back in 1932, a budding young architect named Robert Trent Jones became design partners with the remarkable Stanley Thompson, a highly skilled and ambitious designer who, among other accomplishments, would go on to become co-founder and president of the American Society of Golf Course Architects with Jones and Donald Ross. Considered by many to be the Father of Canadian Golf Architecture, Thompson designed more than 145 courses over his illustrious career, including many of Canada's premier layouts.

Ranked among the top ten courses in Canada by *Golf Digest*, the course is lined by stately pine trees that serve as a foreground for the incredible mountain panorama on every hole. Opened as a 9-hole course built by Old Tom Morris apprentice Bill Thomson, the layout was expanded to 18 holes by Donald Ross in 1923. Only three years later, Stanley Thompson was provided an unlimited budget by the Canadian Pacific Railway to reconfigure the property into a championship course. While a few of the Ross holes were kept when the new track formally opened in 1929, others took proper advantage of the mountain-scape to create the existing course, promoted at the time as "the most expensive course in the world."

The course meanders under the snow-capped peaks of Mount Rundle and Sulphur Mountain and meanders along the scenic waters of the Bow River. Large greens are guarded by sprawling, sometimes deep-faced, bunkers – a Thompson trademark.

Banff Springs director of golf Steve Young effusively praised the course's design and the designer.

# Rocky Mountain High!

Scenery, Nature and Golf Soar at Banff Springs and Jasper Park in Canada

"Thompson was one of Canada's top architects," he said. "Not only was he an architect, he was also an artist. The holes he created are pleasing and appealing to the eye."

Young stated his belief that the scenery the course is set in is "second to none. This is mountain golf," he said. "The layout is located in a very narrow river valley. It follows along the river and the cliffs of the mountain. You are not just visiting a special place – you get to golf in that special place. What more can you ask for?"

The headliner of the Stanley Thompson Course is the iconic par-3 No. 4. Known as the Devil's Cauldron, the hole begins from an elevated tee and traverses over a glacial lake toward a green tucked below towering pines and the majestic shadows cast by Mount Rundle. Make sure to have the battery of your smart phone fully charged before teeing off on this hole as you will undoubtedly want multiple angles and selfies even before you step away from the tee.

Golf historians will appreciate the history of the 380-yard No. 6 as Thompson built a wide landing area here seemingly as an open invitation to fire away at the only original Donald Ross green site left on the course. At 3,200 square feet, this is the smallest green on the course and features subtle swales that are a primary characteristic of Ross's work.

Following a few fine holes that wander away from the mountainside, the 480-yard No. 15 packs an amazing onetwo punch of beauty and challenge. The hole is nicknamed Spray due to its demanding tee shot over the Spray River to a large landing area which is tightened by pines the closer one approaches the putting surface. This hole was previously known as "golf's greatest opening tee shot," as it was the 1st hole until a new clubhouse was built in 1989 and the course was rerouted. In some ways, the positioning is fitting as the player was previously forced to experience a letdown following the exhilaration of launching a first drive into the sky – a mile above sea level! – and toward magnificent Mount Rundle.

Before or after your round at the Thompson Course, consider playing the property's Tunnel Course, the property's third nine. Though it was added in 1989 and thus is not a Thompson design (Geoffrey Cornish and Bill Robinson did the honors), the layout is stunning in its own right and features fabulous views of both the Rockies and the amazing, castle-like Fairmont Banff Springs Hotel.

While the natural beauty of the resort's golf course holds few parallels, the host hotel has no equals anywhere in the world. Known as the "Castle in the Rockies," the hotel was built in the 1880s by railroad baron William Cornelius Van Horne. A flagship property of the Fairmont chain, the hotel serves up first-rate accommodations, cuisine, recreation options and spa services. Time away from the golf course can be spent hiking on paths through the national forest, white water rafting, kayaking, biking, fishing and horseback riding. The town of Banff is an easy stroll downhill from the Fairmont Banff Springs.

#### Fairmont Jasper Park

The route between Banff Springs and Jasper Park has been rightly been called one of the world's most stunning roadways. As a bonus with the mountain scenery of the two national parks, one gets to enjoy forests, icefields, glaciers, crags and an excellent chance at encountering any number of elk, bears, mountain goat, moose and even bighorn sheep. One important note of caution when making this drive: wildlife always enjoy the right of way on the highway; thus, make liberal plans when trying to schedule your tee time during the drive up from Banff Springs.

Indeed, no drive between these two great hotels is complete without a stop at the Fairmont Lake Louise to enjoy a cold beverage while viewing the stunning blue waters of the lake and its mountain backdrop. Just north of the hotel rests the Columbia Icefield and the squadron of glaciers visible always along the Icefields Parkway. Farther along the same road, a stop at Bow Lake yields a view of Crowfoot Glacier hugging the cliffs of Crowfoot Mountain.

While 320 miles seems like a long way to drive for a round or two of golf, take comfort in the knowledge that this will be the shortest four-hour drive of your life. Personally, I was even slightly disappointed that the ride ended so soon!

Situated in Alberta's vast Jasper National Park, Fairmont Jasper Park Lodge is a 700-acre luxury mountain resort that wraps around the pristine waters of Lac Beauvert. The hotel is also vastly different in style and personality from Banff Springs. Elegant cedar chalets and luxury cabins give the property a rustic look that suits the surroundings of forests and mountains.

## We-Ko-Pa Offers Golf and More



Cholla Hole 3

n the decades immediately following World War I, the Phoenix area was a little more than a pass-through town on the way to California. The summers were scorching and air conditioning was a luxury that would not be fully integrated in homes and businesses for another 20 years. The loop freeways synonymous with Phoenix and Scottsdale travel weren't even a glimmer in the eyes of taxpayers or governors. The television boom that captivated the nuclear family was three decades away.


So what did Phoenix residents do for fun before all the hustle and bustle? In short, isten to Roosevelt's fireside chats and play golf. Generations later, people from all over the world flock to the Valley of the Sun for luxury shopping, world-class sporting events, exquisite dining and - above all else - to play absolutely incredible golf. At the very top of the 200 courses in the Phoenix metro area is We-Ko-Pa Golf Club, boasting the No. 1 and No. 10 ranked courses in the entire state.

The Cholla course at We-Ko-Pa Golf Club burst on to the Scottsdale scene in December 2001 as an early Christmas gift wrapped in some of the most scenic Sonoran Desert on the planet. The Saguaro

course followed in 2006. Since then, both have racked up an impressive list of accolades.

Until recently, the We-Ko-Pa experience was more of a day trip – drive out, play golf, drive back. Now, with the emergence of the resort and other fun-filled amenities, that has changed. We-Ko-Pa has been transformed into a viable vacation destination – just far enough away from the city, but just close enough to the magnificent southwest.

It all began a couple years ago, when the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation took over operations of the existing resort off Highway 87 and rebranded it the We-Ko-Pa Resort & Conference Center. Today, the resort features all the vacation-type amenities one would expect, including 246 contemporary quest rooms and suites, Southwestern-inspired cuisine, luxurious spa and salon services, and a heated outdoor pool. And it's well-suited for groups of all shapes and sizes. In fact, they added new Golf Suites as a convenient and comfortable lodging option for stay-and-play vacations. Each of the four newly designed golfthemed suites accommodates four to five quests in two deluxe rooms connected by a living room with a pullout sofa and kitchen.





#### A New Dawn for Sunset Valley

Four years ago, the city of Highland Park faced a dilemma. Due to economic conditions, it was apparent that the community could ill-afford to maintain both of the park district's popular golf courses - Highland Woods Country Club and Sunset Valley Golf Club. While the former had an edge because it was turning a small profit annually, the latter was a sentimental favorite due to its location just a few blocks from the city center.

Illinois Golf Hall of Fame member Joel Hirsch had a say in the final decision as he lobbied the park district for the

retention and renovation of the golf course that launched his interest in the game.

"I started as a caddie at Sunset Valley," Hirsch, who spent his teen years in Highland Park and lives there now, said in an August press conference. "It's always had a fond place in my heart."

The city set aside \$7 million to rehabilitate the golf course, improve drainage and storm water management and remodel the clubhouse. Libertyville architect Rick Jacobson oversaw the renovation of the now 6,726-yard layout which was opened in 1922 and designed by Stewart Gardner. Jacobson's team built 18 new contoured green complexes; lengthened holes No. 5 and 13; added strategic fairway and greenside bunkering, and placed five sets of tees to enhance playability for players of all skill levels. Rather than detract from the original course, the removal of trees from various parts of the layout serve to enhance the beauty of this heathland-style course and provide better sightlines to the greens.

The results of the renovation work are apparent from a single glance from the clubhouse. The wildly contoured practice putting green now serves as a lengthy extension of the 18th green. The once basic greenside and bunkers across the property are now sprawling and deep-faced. And the fescue areas that divide many fairways give the holes increased definition while serving as an added challenge to wayward players.

Last year's winner of the Illinois State Amateur Championship Patrick Flavin grew up playing Sunset Valley and raved about the renovation work. "These greens used to be flat as a pancake," he commented after firing a 5-underpar 67 on media day. "The contours added by Rick truly add



a strategic element that the course was previously missing." Flavin, 22, turned pro in August and is seeking to qualify for the Web.com pro circuit.

Highlighting the course's front nine is the signature No. 4, a 162-yard par-3 protected by native grasses on the left and a stone-lined pond on the right. Take dead aim at the pin on this large putting surface and let 'er rip! Before leaving the tee, take a quick snapshot of this terrific hole.

The course finishes with a pair of opposites. The par-5 502-yard 17th is made difficult due to multiple hazards off the tee. Avoid water on the left knowing that a large fairway bunker lurks in the landing area on the right. While a pair of bunkers protect the flagstick, a deftly struck 3-wood can reach this green in two.

The 354-yard 18th is a relatively short par-4 that allows players to recover from previous disasters with a possible birdie. Beware of a pin position in the middle of this green, however, as a swale just past the flag can funnel the ball back onto the aforementioned practice putting surface. While you undoubtedly won't make birdie from this point, you can take consolation that you are only a few steps away from a cold beverage in the clubhouse, which was gutted to remove decades of drab decor and reimagined with great views from the inside, the 13ninety Grill, a restaurant with a lively menu, and a patio to dine outside while watching golf.

"I'm really proud of the work we performed here at Sunset Valley," said Jacobson. "Ever since it was built back in the 1920s, the course had experienced serious issues with storm water management. We not only fixed that issue, we improved playability, made the course more challenging and pretty, and also upgraded the playing surface. It has been wonderful to hear good things about the renovation from players like Joel and Patrick who were obviously fond of the original course."

### Down Memory Lane

#### **Jack on the Attack**

Beware the Golden Bear when his putter is hot.

This was true for about 40 years, from the time Jack Nicklaus was a junior until he essentially retired from senior golf. If you needed someone to sink a 10-footer to pay the mortgage, you called Jack. As he said once, deprecating his average short game, "I made everything I looked at."

Among his hottest putting rounds came 50 years ago, when he beat a formidable field to score his second straight victory in the

Nicklaus would win the 1968 Western, played on Olympia Fields Country Club's North Course, with his putter, scoring 11-under-par 273 across 72 holes, and twice tying the course's formidable course record of 65, set 28 years earlier by Lawson Little in U.S. Open sectional qualifying.

It started right away.

"On the first hole I dropped a 30-footer for a birdie, and as I went down the second fairway I tried to think when I'd ever dropped a 30-footer and I couldn't," Jack said, exaggerating only slightly.

What he hadn't done was drop a 30-footer recently. He credited switching back to the blade putter with which he'd won the 1966 British Open, putting in the closet "White Fang," which he used to win the 1967 U.S. Open.

Nicklaus one-putted six greens and took 30 putts in the first round, soared to a 1-over 72 in the second round, and posted another 65 in the third round – which featured a 28-foot birdie putt on the ninth hole and followed a 60-foot two-putt for birdie on the first, where his eagle putt stopped six inches from the cup. His eagle finally flew on the par-5 18th after a 215-yard 1-iron to six feet.

He finished with an even-par 71 to beat Miller Barber by three strokes and Australian Bob Stanton by four. It was Nicklaus' first victory of the year, coming when he putted his best.

The Tom Bendelow layout was refurbished two years ago and reopened in June 2017. It features seven sets of tees, more than Medinah's other two courses.

#### **Stonebridge Saves Birdies for** Charity

On Labor Day evening, as Birdies for Charity event co-chair and pro Chris Gumbach watched the skies open and the rain-soaked River Forest Country Club go from playable to unplayable in a matter of minutes, he wasn't sure if the eighth Birdies for Charity fundraising event could be played the next day as scheduled.

Enter Andrew Stevens, the professional at Stonebridge Country Club in Aurora, and the club's Board, who offered their course as an alternate site in the nick of time.

Illinois PGA Professionals made 1.014 birdies to raise a record \$378,000 to benefit children's charities including Ann and Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, JDRF Illinois Chapter, Ronald McDonald House Charities of Chicagoland and Northwest Indiana, Illinois PGA Foundation and bonus charities Cal's Angels and Folds of Honor. The eightyear event total now stands at nearly \$1.4 million.

The landing area was widened and part of the arroyo was grassed to create a more realistic risk/reward scenario.

"After 15 years, it was time to reinvigorate Cholla to maintain the type of conditions consistent with the high level of playability our guests have come to expect," said Matt Barr.

Saguaro – designed by Bill Coore and Ben Crenshaw - incorporates desert golf with traditional golf course design It's built for walking, with greens situated near the next tee. It follows the natural movement of the land, and the playing corridors are wider - some much wider – compared to Cholla. When the particular patch of ground is flat and open, the hole is, too. Likewise, when the landscape pitches and rolls, so does

the layout. And just like Cholla, Saguaro recently underwent its own preventative maintenance project which consisted of replacing all the sand and inspecting the drain lines of each bunker.

If you can't decide which to play or how often to play each award-winning golf course, don't worry. We-Ko-Pa offers incredible stay-and-play packages as well as 36-hole packages so you can take your time exploring the similarities and differences of each course.

"They're both amazing, but they're both very different," said Eric Dettman, We-Ko-Pa's head professional. "Saguaro,

for example, is perfect for winter walking with wide fairways guarded by iconic Coore-Crenshaw bunkers. And Cholla will test your strategic thinking and shot selection. You really have to play them both to get a feel of the desert, but you haven't really played desert golf until you've played We-Ko-Pa."



Jasper Park Lodge Golf Club is rated by many national golf magazines as Canada's premier course. A Stanley Thompson design, the layout was the end result of an epic project that took 50 teams of horses and 200 men working together for a year to clear the boulders and debris prior to construction. The 18 holes feature elevated tee boxes and dramatic bunkering carved through thick forests and over rugged terrain.

The signature hole on the front nine is No. 9, aptly named Cleopatra for its awesome beauty. The 231-yard par 3 plays at least two clubs shorter as the fairway slopes downhill toward a green surrounded by Thompson's signature bunkers.

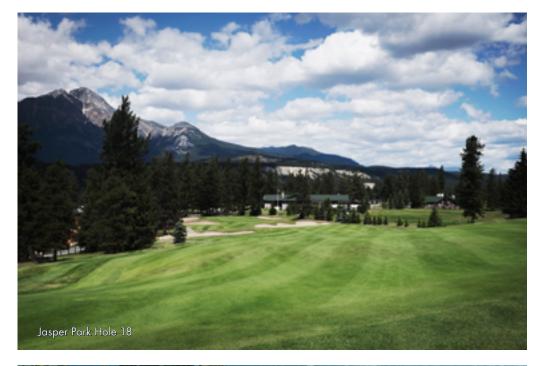
The back nine is highlighted by No. 14, a 361-yard par 4 that features the aforementioned Lac Beauvert along its entire left side. Optimal precision is required both off the tee to avoid the lake and toward the green, divided into two parts by a ridge that either pulls the approach shot toward the flagstick or – as in my case – detours the shot away from the flagstick to set up a long, uncomfortable putt.

Jasper Park Lodge features 442 superbly appointed quest rooms, suites and cabins. Outdoor amenities include kayaking on the lake and hiking on one of the many mountain trails. Dining options are highlighted by Rocky Mountain cuisine in any of the resort's eight restaurants which showcase local and organic foods.

When extolling nature in his epic song "Rocky Mountain High," folk singer John Denver referenced the elements of nature that make a stay in the mountains so special, including the walks in quiet solitude, the forests, the streams and seeing everything "as far as you can see." A golf trip to Banff Springs and Jasper Park in the Canadian Rockies offers all of those attributes along with luxurious accommodations. What more, as Steve Young referenced, can you ask for?

## **Evocative Imagery**

n 1973, newlyweds Mike and Mary Benziger drove west and permanently settled in Northern California. Seven years later, Mike and and his brother Bruno Benziger purchased the historic Wegener Ranch on Sonoma Mountain in Glen Ellen, Calif. Hearing the Sirens call of the Golden State, over the next six years the four remaining siblings — Bob, Joe, Jerry, and Patsy, with their spouses — made their way to California.

In 1986, winemaker Joe Benziger first partnered with artist Bob Nugent to launch the Imagery Series of wines. This pairing of wine and art continues to this day, and permeates every aspect of Imagery Winery, including unique artwork replicated on every label. The dedicated on-site art gallery features label artwork commissioned from some of the world's most notable contemporary artists, and includes over 500 works by over 300 artists. Currently, around 60 pieces are on view in the gallery.

At any given time, as many as 35 artists are working on pieces that will appear on future Imagery wine labels. The artists are not limited by size, medium, or content – the only exception is that the work must include a likeness of the Parthenon replica on the Benziger Estate, which serves as the winery's signature image.

Joe Benziger has dedicated his career to crafting rare wines from uncommon varietals such as Malbec, Tempranillo, and Lagrein. These limited-production wines are available to wine club members only.

However, that doesn't mean Imagery is inaccessable. Following in her father Joe's footsteps, middle-daughter Jamie Benziger is the winemaker in charge of Imagery's new and more popularly-priced collection of Cabernet Sauvignon, Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay, and Pinot Noir. The label is characterized with a "drip" motif, suggestive of both wine and paint.

#### 2016 Chardonnay

This offering presents initial subtle aromas of ripe apple, pear, and lime. It is pale-straw colored in the glass. It greets the palate with flavors of further apple and lemon, plus a touch of steeliness from the cold fermentation and minimal oak. The wine is

enlivened with the addition of 5% Chenin Blanc, and the finish is bright and fresh.

This wine would work well with Vietnamese turkey and glass noodle salad, sea bass with golden mash, or kedgeree risotto.

#### 2016 Cabernet Sauvignon

This Cab starts out with a nose of dark fruit, vanilla, and toasted oak. Then come the flavors of blackberries, plum, and cherries. The blend is 85% Cabernet Sauvignon and 15% Petite Syrah, the latter lending unusual spice and pepper notes. The wine is fruit forward and velvety soft, with moderate tannins and medium acidity. The winery is targeting this wine at the hotel trade, so it might take a bit of effort to locate.

Serve this easy-going red with pancetta-wrapped sausages, finger-lickin' ribs, or saffron roast lamb with sticky garlic potatoes.

## Let's Really Grow the Game

ve been hearing the phrase "growing the game" for so long now, I'm not sure it has any more meaning for me than "through the green."

Year in and year out, new initiatives are launched to reach more women, millennials and kids. Yet each year, participation in the game decreases and golf gets older, whiter and more

Which is why I've been on the lookout for people and golf courses doing new and innovative things to get new players into the game, lest all those classic courses that have been lovingly restored find themselves converted into green spaces.

Nationally, the First Tee program is a cornerstone that brings in money, kids, and publicity, but I keep asking, what else is going on out there? While these examples are from the American west, where I've lived for years, they apply to anywhere, including Chicago, where I was born and bred.

While reporting for a piece on Rockwind Community Links, a 2015 Andy Staples redesign of a tired track in the New Mexico oil-patch town of Hobbs I learned that a nine-hole par-3 course with holes 35 to 85 yards was included - not as an adjunct but as a centerpiece of the \$12 million project.

Any number of kids accompanying a paying adult can play the "L'il Rock" course for free – and golf shop staffers confess that if a kid came out without an adult, they'd likely play for free, too.

On any given day year-round, there are between 20 and 40 kids at Rockwind participating in some kind of junior golf program. But the clincher came from Kristie Hughes, program manager for the First Tee of Southeastern New Mexico: They take kids as young as three years old in "parent-assisted programs" - meaning the parents stay and participate instead of just dropping off their kids.

"We like to market the First Tee in many different ways, especially to parents who don't play golf," Hughes said. "They're very intimidated. Golf is known as a rich man's sport. We want to turn that around and let people know that golf is accessible."

Ka-boom. The genius shines through. Get the parents in the door when the little ones are three to five years old and you've broken through the intimidation barrier non-golfing moms and dads experience walking into a pro shop a few years later wondering how much this kids' golf thing is going to cost them.

The early start gives Rockwind more years to expose a kid to the game, and parents grow comfortable dropping off their kids at the course for the day, safe in the knowledge they'll have a day of wholesome athletic play in a park-like

In Utah, at Red Ledges, a private community with a Jack Nicklaus golf course near Park City, (profiled in this magazine this summer) the developers took Nicklaus' advice and did two things. First, they scrapped the nine-hole course they had planned in favor of Nicklaus's suggestion of a 12-hole par 3 course with holes 107 to 183 yards long. Second, they created a fifth set of tees, the "Golden Bear" tees, well down the fairway of the championship course, turning a 7,569-yard monster into a 3,700-yard walk in the park for new players graduating to the big course.

But the real Red Ledges magic happens on the wide-open golf park, whose concave elevated green complexes funnel balls to the hole – to either a regulation-size hole or an 8-inch cup. A kid or a family can play a couple of holes, six holes, 12 holes, or even 18 in a stress-free setting. Or maybe they just walk the dog while whacking a ball now and then.

At my home course, Santa Ana Golf Club in Albuquerque, Santa Ana Pueblo member and PGA Professional Jason Montoya runs a program for juniors, many of them Native Americans, that teaches golf but also plants the seed that golf can be an entry to an outdoor occupation not just as a player, but as a maintenance crew

Instructor Sandy Lemon organizes golf and wine parties and fashion shows for new and novice women players – keying on the social aspect of the game.

Golf is a business and any business needs to market itself innovatively. Bottom line: It's time for some fresh thinking out there.
