From the Apache Clubhouse offering natural steaks aged onsite, and Constantino's at the Chiricahua Clubhouse offering a casual Italian menu, to the Spanish cantina that is the Arizona Grill at the Outlaw Clubhouse, there is something for every taste here.

The 25,000-square-foot Sonoran Clubhouse features the fitness center and spa and is the community hub for family activities. 



There's Only One Sweet Spot

fyou take a close look at your game, you'll find that you make most of your two-foot putts, but begin to miss a significant number of putts somewhere between three and six feet from the hole. Everyone does.

There's a combination of things that lead to putting inaccuracy as you get farther from the hole. Where you aim your putter face and how firmly you stroke the putt are major factors. Then there's the break due to the slope, and the speed and quality of the green. But you know all this. After a few years of playing the game, your aim became instinctive, you developed the touch to create the proper energy in your stroke for good putt-speed control, and the knowledge of just how much your putts tend to break at the speeds you roll them became ingrained in your DNA.

The factor you may not be paying attention to, however, is the quality of your impact. The precise location of the strike on your putter face influences both the amount of energy transferred to the putt and its starting direction. There's only one small point on any putter face that's truly "sweet" — the point on the strike area that results in zero putter-head rotation and maximum energy transfer at contact.

To see if you're stroking putts on the sweet spot, place a piece of impact tape on the face of your putter and roll 30 different-length putts on the practice green. If your impact pattern is less than 3/8 inch in diameter and near your putter's sweet spot, that's good. If it's larger, or centered away from the sweet spot, you need to practice with a feedback device called the "Teacher" clip (visit pelzgolf.com) to train your putting stroke for solid impact. And I promise: groove a sweetspot stroke and you'll see sweet putting results!

THE FITNESS EDGE

s we enter fall many of us will be storing our golf clubs for another long, cold Midwest winter. But before you drift into your winter slumber take a moment and ask a few questions about your golf game:

Did your ball striking struggle as a round progressed?


Did your ball striking struggle as the season progressed?

Did you develop any pain or physical problems during this season?

These may be a sign that you do not have the stability to maintain a consistent swing. When golfers become fatigued, they compensate, leading to an inconsistent swing, poor scores, and possibly even injury. So the first step to a better golf game for next year could be an exercise program this off-season.

If you do not have much time to exercise, or have not performed exercises in the past, try to do 30 minutes five days a week. If your time is limited, the best area to address is the core muscle groups, including the abdominals, back, hip, and leg muscles. In previous issues, several exercises were discussed that address the core muscles, and together make a good exercise program. Some of the exercises in those articles use inexpensive equipment if you want variety and a greater challenge, but they are not needed.

The plank exercise is great to strengthen the entire trunk (March 2013 issue). The exercise is performed face down propped up on your elbows and toes as you hold your trunk straight. Hold each repetition 10 seconds for 5 to 10 repetitions. As your strength increases, you can hold for longer periods up to 30 seconds. The side plank is another version of the exercise. Lay on your side propped up on an elbow and the side of your feet while keeping your trunk in a straight line.



The following is a possible schedule, but depending on your current physical condition you may tolerate more or less.

Days 1, 3 and 5:


Lunges and lunges with a trunk twist: 10 to 20 repetitions.

Walk-over push-ups and regular push-ups: five to 20 repetitions.

Plank and side plank: five repetitions

Standing rows and pull-ups: 10 to 20 repetitions.

Standing rows are a great way to strengthen the upper back and shoulders in addition to the core muscles (May/June 2014 issue). Attach the band to a stable object and stand facing the band with your arms extended. Then pull the band back with both hands to your belt line as you squeeze your shoulder blades together for 10 repetitions. Add pull-ups to your routine and your back will be covered.

Warm up with jogging, jumping jacks, or stretching for five minutes.

Davs 2 and 4:

Cardiovascular exercise for 30 minutes and flexibility exercise.



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Wine of La Mancha

If you're looking for something different this year, this Spanish red is 80% Bobal (from 60-year-old vines) and 20% Malbec and Monastrell (from 15-yearold vines). 





"When I took over the course it needed a lot of work. My main focus was the tee boxes and the greens and now our greens are among the best in the area," said Roenick. "It was a tough transition getting the course back to the condition it deserved, and once we got there we had to really work on Greens is an upscale company that designs and builds artificial greens and chipping areas. The gallery on their website is enough to get you thinking, "Do we really need the garage?"

Aside from great hockey memories here in Chicago, Roenick also has a deep past revolving around golf in our area. In his early days with the Blackhawks he played a majority of his golf with teammate Doug Wilson at Butterfield Country Club,

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Really...How Come Your Life Isn't Like This?

The man has been "living the dream" for most of his 66 years. A PGA Hall of Fame career highlighted by a record-setting U.S. Open win in 1973; eight PGA tour wins the following year. Finally, after winning a total of 25 times on tour, he then becomes one of the most famous TV golf analysts ever.

And now, after recently becoming the owner and "re-designer" of his own iconic golf course in Napa, California, (actually 36 holes), he has snagged the 2014 version of the PGA Tour's Frys.com Championship, to be hosted by him on the North Course of his Silverado Country Club on October 6-12, 2014. The tournament will be the opening event of the 2014-2015 FedEx Cup season.

The man is John Laurence Miller, known to most of us golf fans as "Johnny." And, if you're going to San Francisco (song lyrics!), make note that his Silverado courses are open to public play. Keep in mind, however, you are required to stay at the resort as a resort guest for at least one night. Depending on the season, a one-night package can be had for as little as \$244, and you can get a free second round of golf on your day of arrival after 2 PM.

The story of Miller becoming the owner of Silverado has many back stories and sub-plots:

- He played Silverado as a kid, coming over from his hometown of San Francisco.
- A couple of his earliest PGA tour wins came on the Silverado North Course in what was then called the "Kaiser Invitational."
- He raised his six children at Silverado, in a home located just off the 11th tee of the North Course.
- The original owner of the property where Silverado now stands was a U.S. Civil War general also named John Miller (no relation), but that's a whole 'nother story, for

And now, Johnny Miller has brought his legacy at Silverado full circle, buying the place with a couple of partners in 2010 and spearheading a substantial redesign of the tournament North Course over the past

"I can't say I dreamed of owning it because the thought never entered my mind," said the two-time major winner, who once lived in a home on the 11th hole. "But I sure thought about redesigning these courses about 4,000 times, probably as far back as the early 1970s. I said we could do one course and show the world and the membership what the potential of these courses are, and breathe a little life into this iconic property."

"My goal was to give the course a more clean and open look, to make it more pristine and frame things with the gorgeous old oaks, pines, and redwoods," Miller explained. "We did this by adding some new strategic bunkers, eliminating 15 to 20 bunkers that I disliked, re-grassing the fairways with Kentucky bluegrass, and re-aligning some fairways. We also removed and trimmed up a lot of trees."

"I'm a big believer in not having too many bunkers," he said. "At Silverado at least, my bunkers are there for a real good reason. They change the hole and make you think. They are not decorative bunkers. They're strategic."

One of the big differences at the course when I played it earlier this year, compared to a few years ago, is the phenomenal condition and speed of the greens. With a lot of contour and slope, they are some of the nicest, fastest, and challenging this golf writer has ever encountered. They are really fun—and sometimes maddening!

The course reminds me a bit of the midwest's Point O'Woods CC in Benton Harbor, Michigan, if you've seen that. Silverado was originally built at about the same time, in 1966, and was designed by Robert Trent Jones, Jr. Point O'Woods was designed by his father, Robert Trent Jones, Sr.

Miller has been involved in designing over 40 courses over the last 30-plus years. When he is hired to do the job, he typically makes course visits totaling 10 or 12 days during design and build-out. But for the Silverado North Course, he was on the site approximately 40 days total.

"When you own the place, and you've spent a good portion of your life thinking of how you could make it better, and you know it like the back of your hand, that makes it a whole different ball game," Miller says. "I made every decision. If you hate it, you can blame me. If you love it, you can blame me. I may not be the world's greatest course designer, but I do know this property, and with the budget we had, I knew I could do a better job than anybody because I knew every inch of this place."

Tim Geesey, who Johnny hired as his original Director of Golf Operations in 2010, tells the story of how Johnny stood out on the 18th hole of the North Course for most of an entire day during his re-design phase, trying to figure out how to best route and bunker that finishing hole. Finally, Geesey went out to join Miller. To try to give him some stimulating advice, Geesey suggested a fairway bunker down the left side of the fairway. Miller instantly retorted, "Noooo, that wouldn't be good."

With new back tees designed and installed by Miller, Silverado now measures out at 7,226 yards from the tips and will be more than ready to challenge the PGA stars. The Frys.com Championship will open the 2014-2015 tour season with a full field of 144 players with a \$5 million purse and a \$900,000 first prize.

Miller has opined that the renovated North Course is "as hard as Pebble Beach," and all golf fans know what Miller thinks of Pebble. It is a tough test.

"When the Tour pros play here from the back tees and no rough, with the greens running fast, I'd be surprised if anyone shot 12 or 13 under par for an event, which is strong for no rough," says Miller. "This is a tough golf course. These greens are as tough as just about any at high speeds. I would probably have five three-putts a round."

It seems a large part of Miller's thinking about Silverado is leaving a legacy for his family. Greg Norman has his businesses, Arnold Palmer has Bay Hill, and Jack Nicklaus has Muirfield.


"One thing I learned from Greg Norman is that I wanted to create something that was family legacy, create a brand or have an iconic property like this where people in the family could work, or something that just goes on. That's what a family business does, goes on for generations," Miller said.


As the writer of this story, I wanted to bring it to Chicago-area readers because I feel Silverado is one of the best places to visit in the U.S, particularly for a winter getaway. Now, part of the attraction for me is that it is in Napa, California, and I love my fine wines, as well. But the whole package is tough to beat-two gorgeous golf courses, an iconic resort property, the Napa-Sonoma attractions and vineyards, and great year-round weather. There is also a 16,000 square-foot spa on property and ten swimming pools, for those looking for those amenities.

To be hanging out in Napa playing the North Course at Silverado is sublime. The rumors are that the tour wives are very excited about the Frys.com tourney and the opportunity to hang out in Napa.

Rates at the resort vary by season and demand, so it is best to check the website or to call the club, but I have seen two-day, two-night packages for as little as \$400 a person, which includes two-rounds of golf for two people—one round on each of the resort courses. Plus, free replays are included, so you could get in 72 holes each

If you really love the place, as I do, you can think about joining for \$40,000 to \$60,000 in initiation fees (depending on if you buy property) plus fairly typical country club fees for dues, food minimums, golf carts, and the like. I may do it one of these days! The place is a dream.

Chicago Open to Tee Off At Cantigny Golf in October

The 100th anniversary of the launch of the Chicago Open will coincide with the 25th anniversary of Cantigny Golf October 5-7 when the Wheaton golf complex hosts what at one time was one of country's premier golf championships. Qualifying for the tournament occurred in August and September in Milwaukee, Metamora, Glen Ellyn, Benton Harbor, Michigan, and North Barrington.

Past champions of the Chicago Open include golf legends Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, and Byron Nelson. Former world No. 1 player and Northwestern star Luke Donald won the event in 2000.

The 2014 event is being conducted for the second consecutive year by and for the benefit of the Illinois Junior Golf Association. Last year's Open drew a field of top amateur and professional golfers from 18 states and three countries. It served as a tune-up to the fall's PGA Tour Qualifying School completion. The event was won by Carlos Sainz. Jr., an Elgin native and former IJGA member. Sainz is today a fully-exempt player on the Web.com Tour. At press time, Sainz anticipated returning to defend his title.

"Our goal was to provide an opportunity for aspiring tour pros and top amateurs to compete at a high level as they make their way toward their ultimate goal of playing on the PGA Tour," says Marty Schiene, immediate past president of the IJGA and former touring pro. "Playing in a competition with such a rich history can make the event that much more meaningful to the contestants."

Spectators are welcome to attend the tournament for a chance to witness history. IJGA is the second-largest junior golf program in the nation. It serves 2,800 golfers between 8 and 18 and manages more than 100 separate events throughout Illinois.

Host of the 2007 U.S.
Amateur Championship and named "Best New Pubic Course in America" when it opened in 1989, Cantigny Golf is owned by the Chicagobased Robert R. McCormick Foundation and is managed by area sports management firm KemperSports. The 300-acre complex incorporates

27 holes of golf, a year-round golf academy and a 9-hole Youth Links.

Foss Park: Where Everybody Knows Your

There was a single, simple formula that TV comedy series "Cheers" employed to such a huge success in the 1980s. All fans of the show yearned to hang out at a bar where, as the show's theme song warbled, "everybody knows your name." And by the time the series ended in 1993, we felt we knew characters like Cliff, Norm, Carla, Dr. Frazier Crane, and Sam Malone intimately.

A little over 20 years after "Cheers" went off the air, a golf version of that show seems to take place seven davs a week at Foss Park Golf Club in North Chicago. While players get their money's worth taking on the well-manicured 6,839vard course, a newcomer quickly senses that regulars enter the clubhouse as much to enjoy bantering with the club's remarkably upbeat staff members as they do to buy green fees. Foss Park G.C. is as much about Gabe and Kimber and Mike as it is about the tight, tree-lined fairways that highlight the middle holes on both nines, or about the tough over-water par 3 that can make or break a round.

Opened in 1974, Foss Park is a great course to walk as the landmass is relatively flat and tees are located in close proximity to greens. While the lack of hills and valleys might reduce the layout's "wow" factor, meticulous conditioning of fairways, greens, and sand bunkers has made the course a popular attraction for golfers who come here from Chicago, Waukegan, and as far away as Milwaukee.

No round at Foss Park is complete without a stop inside the clubhouse to enjoy a sandwich and beverage while watching a football game or a PGA Tour event in the sports themed café and bar area. On my last visit in early September, I was reminded again why so many golfers return to the property week after week. Children from a wedding reception held at the property's banquet hall had invaded the clubhouse after word got out that free popcorn had been freshly popped. Staff members happily took turns filling up cups and travs so each of the kids received an ample serving. "Here you go, young lady," said head professional and general manager Gabe Kaplan as he found time out of his busy schedule to help out behind the bar.

Venturi's Double

"I'm still the defending champion of the Chicago Open!"

Those words came from the happy voice of Ken Venturi back when the Western Open was still the Western Open, Cog Hill was the site, and CBS was the television outlet.

It was 1991, and the Western had shifted from Butler National to Cog Hill, which is around the corner from Gleneagles Country Club, the site of Venturi's back-to-back victories, two of the 14 wins in the World Golf Hall of Fame member's career.

He won the Gleneagles-Chicago Open in both 1958 and 1959, the only times it was staged. The McNulty family, which owned Gleneagles, then and now, saw an opening on the tournament calendar when George S. May canceled his All-American Open and World Championship double weekend at Tam O'Shanter. Suddenly, the richest weekend on the circuit was no more.

The McNultys stepped in with a \$50,000 purse, which in 1958 was among the largest of the season, and brought back the old Chicago Open name. (These days, the Illinois Junior Golf Association uses it for an October tournament at Cantigny.)

Venturi won both times. In 1991, the family threw a celebratory luncheon, honoring Venturi's achievements. The memories came flooding back.

Then and when it happened, he knew his success was not his alone. His first win at Gleneagles was his sixth on tour and fourth of the season, but Venturi hadn't won since Baton Rouge in the spring. At Gleneagles, he led wire-to-wire, navigating four days of vexing pin placements on the best 18 holes from the combined Red and White courses, his 8-under-par 272 beating Julius Boros and Jack Burke by a stroke despite a closing 2-over 72.

His help? A few motivational words from his wife Conni, who traveled the tour with him. "For three months I've been in a slump," he said at the award presentation, never mind that he was rarely out of the top 25 in 1958. "She told me today, 'You're never defeated until you quit.""

That \$9,000 success was repeated in 1959, when the purse was boosted to \$57,000, and this time, Venturi had to come from behind. He was five strokes in arrears of Johnny Pott, in fourth place behind Bo Wininger and Arnold Palmer, entering the final round. Pott had opened with a record 63 and had closed strongly in the windy third round.

Venturi caught Pott on the front nine and took the lead on the only par 5 on the back nine, the 490-yard 13th. A driver and 4 iron put him 25 feet from the cup. Pott had already scrambled for par here, but Venturi sank his putt for an eagle 3, then birdied the 14th for the cushion that would allow him to post a 66 for 7-under 273 and withstand Pott's late rally. He was standing by the scorer's table when Pott looked at a 35-foot putt to tie at the last hole.

"I was more nervous on that shot than if I'd had to make the putt myself," Venturi told *Tribune* columnist Dave Condon after Pott's putt rolled past the hole. He then went to a telephone to call Conni in San Francisco. "This is the first big one that Conni hasn't seen me win. I'll tell her about it but I don't think I can explain."

Small Wins Big At 92nd Illinois PGA Championship

Illinois golf coach and Mike Small added to his legendary status as a player in late August when he captured the state PGA Championship with three rounds of 67-67-66 at Stonewall Orchard in Grayslake. His final score tied Small's previous record of 200 set in 2010 at Olympia Field Country Club — South Course. Steve Orrick, head professional at Decatur Country Club, finished second with rounds of 69-70-66=205.



"It just feels good to be able to play good golf again," Small said following his victory. "I haven't played solid golf for a full tournament in a while so it's nice to play three good ones in a row."

While Small had a commanding five stroke lead going into the event's final round, Orrick took a run at him on the front nine with a score of five-under-par 31. He was unable to sustain that pace, however, as Small pulled away from Orrick and the rest of the pack to notch his 11th state PGA Championship title.

Golf Channel's Papa Enjoyed Chicago Visit

The Golf Channel's Bob Papa is a busy man. Along with his duties covering the Champions Tour in the booth next to Lanny Wadkins and John Mahaffey, Papa is the voice of the

New York Giants and of the New Jersey Nets. He took a few minutes away from announcing Tom Lehmann's thrilling victory at the Encompass Championship in July to talk about golf and his career.

"My most memorable moment covering the tour so far was watching Kenny Perry fire final rounds of 63-64 to win the Constellation Senior Players Championship in 2013," he said. "It was simply an impressive display of golf."

A caddy as a youngster growing up in New Jersey, Papa is currently a member at Baltusrol. He credits legendary New York sportscaster Marty Glickman with helping get his career on track. "Marty invited me into his home in New York, listened to my tapes and gave me great advice," he said.

Papa travels around the country representing the Colon Cancer Alliance, a not-for-profit organization that promotes early cancer awareness. "The best way to stop colon cancer is through early detection through screening," Papa said. "Two years ago, the FDA approved Prepopik—an oral preparation for colonoscopies that only requires consumption of 10 ounces instead of the full gallon required of traditional prep solutions." A colonoscopy is recommended every 10 years for adults over 50 years of age.

Holmes Recognized as Illinois PGA Golf Professional of the Year

Ravinia Green Country Club's Jim Holmes was named the 60th recipient of the Illinois PGA Golf Professional of the Year award—the highest annual honor bestowed by the Illinois PGA on a member pro.

Holmes, now in his 29th year as PGA head golf professional at the Riverwoods club, will be honored at the Illinois PGA Special Awards Ceremony on October 23rd at Medinah C.C. "I am completely overwhelmed being named the Illinois PGA Golf Professional of the Year," he said upon learning of the award. "It's a pretty impressive fraternity of Illinois PGA professionals on the list of former award winners. I'm honored and humbled to be mentioned in the same light as those gentlemen. To do something you love and are passionate about for over 30 years is very rewarding."

Other honorees at the awards ceremony include Palatine's Katie Dick who was named Assistant Golf Professional of the Year; Gary Pinns of Wheaton who was named Teacher of the Year, and Todd Sones of Vernon Hills who will receive the Horton Smith Award.

Bunker Mentality

BEYOND BUNKERS

This is certain: bunker design, aesthetics, and strategy have evolved. Once just open pits with rugged edges and unkempt floors, bunkers are now the second most expensive and maintained feature on the golf course. Architecturally, bunkers are a key element on the golf course, help define the essence of a course's personality, and should offer beauty, challenge, and fairness. To create such bunkers, golfers should expect higher costs and slower play.

First, it must be noted that bunkers are hazards and no uncorrupted understanding of the game will ever consent to "fairness" within a hazard. Bunkers are hazards, and whether they are fair, or not, is beside the question.

As Alister Mackenzie, the iconic Golden Age architect, once said "It is the job of the golfer to avoid the bunker." For instance, the Road Hole bunker at St. Andrews is anything but fair, yet it is still considered one of the best, most important bunkers in golf.

Bunkers are not fair: bunkers are hazards that play an important role in how the golfer plays the hole, absorbs the hole's strategy, and absorbs the aesthetic of the design. The British term a bunker "proper," or not, based upon its relevance to play.

Most golf holes are better with bunkers, but not always, and more is not necessarily better. A once notorious hole in Myrtle Beach had 50 bunkers on a mid-length par 4. Thankfully, that has been revised and "only" offers about a dozen bunkers now. Many architects are reverting to a more rugged style, less manicured and less presumed maintenance cost. These are good options depending on the site, the clientele, and the maintenance operations.

"Renovation architects" argue the particulars of historic golf course architects and their styles. Clearly, some "Golden Age" architects had specific bunker proclivities, but more often than not, those "Golden" architects tended to have an approach and more general technique that would be adjusted depending on the client, market, and site conditions.

This is still true today.


Waking up the Course at Rich Harvest Farms

His office has been called Augusta North. When Jeff VerCautren pulls into his Sugar Grove "cubicle," he knows that his efforts deserve comparisons to places like Augusta National. Rich Harvest Farms is on the bucket list for any golfer who has pursued the daunting task of playing America's top 100 golf courses. For Chicagoland golfers, an experience at Rich Harvest is a feather in the cap and brag tag on their golf bag. If you have played a round at Jerry Rich's masterpiece, then you have a story for the

grandkids.

Jeff VerCautren, 38 years old, loves his office, which encompasses a 2,000 acre estate and also happens to be the site of one of the most exclusive golf clubs in the country. As superintendent of Rich Harvest Farms, VerCautren likens his job to that of a superintendent for a major league baseball team's ballpark, "My team's efforts are showcased each day. Our course must exceed



our members' and their guests' expectations."
VerCautren adds, "A day at a major league
ballpark is a treat. A round of golf at Rich
Harvest Farms is like giving fans a chance to
play inside the ivy at Wrigley Field."

The responsibilities of a superintendent at an elite private golf club are heavily weighted on reaction to things you cannot control. Elements like the force of Mother Nature, common turf disease, and the wrath of pestilence require experience and a proactive maintenance philosophy. "Mr. Rich provides my team with all the tools and resources to maintain one of the best golf courses in the world," shares VerCautren, "There's nothing better than hearing our members rave about how well the course is playing."

In order to get it right, VerCautren relies on his intimate knowledge of the course and his management experiences at TPC Prestancia in Sarasota, Florida, and

3:45am Rise and Shine

"I usually beat my alarm to the punch, then it is a big cup of coffee and a five minute commute to the shop. Bunker, my nine-yearold golden retriever, needs a nudge to wake up at this hour. He is the smart one."

4:30am Planning and Communication

"I email our department managers about what the golf course and grounds crews have planned for the day. Before the sun rises, I meet with our assistant superintendents to prioritize duties. We set up and assign equipment for the operators."

5:00am Game Plan with Assistant Superintendents

"Growing grass is only 10% of my job. We set up the daily job board and check equipment that was serviced. With a golf course staff that includes over 30 full-time positions, I am also a human resources manager. My staff includes

four, full-time assistant superintendents, three mechanics, and 24 operators. We have over 100 members. Those individuals and their guests are my bosses; oddly, that is the fun part. They ask great questions and want to hear about our current projects."

5:30am Game On!

"It is an impressive sight to see all the operators and equipment roll out of the shop to wake up the course. At this point of the morning, all of us are on a mission. I know that Bunker wishes he was asleep and at home with my wife and daughters."

5:35am Cutting Cups with Bunker

"I cut all the cups. This is my favorite part of the day. I get to see the guys on their



machines, look at the course from the top of our greens, and get my feet on all 18 holes of the course. I also take stimp readings to make sure our greens are rolling at PGA Tour speeds. We pride ourselves on the fact that we could host a professional event without a day's notice."

7:00am Coffee with Golf Staff

"I check in with the golf staff. We make sure that we are on the same page and coordinate our days. Bunker usually grabs a snack."



7:15am to 10:00am Back to Cups

"I usually meet with Mr. Rich on the course while I am cutting cups or meeting with the golf staff. Afterwards, I check the progress of the operators, spray the greens, and take notes."

10:00am to 11:30am The Office

"It isn't just about greens. Paperwork is just like the course. You need to stay on top of it. I complete daily purchase orders, return e-mails and phone calls, and meet with our general manager. Before I return to the course, I grab a quick lunch and call my assistants and interns."

11:30am to 3:30pm The Other Office

"After lunch, I begin my second tour of the course, work on projects, and meet with my



assistants and interns on the course. Every day I see and do different things. I go from greens keeper to plumber to electrician to operator. After finishing office manager and accountant duties behind the desk, working outside gives me my second wind. All superintendents are outside pets."

3:30pm to 4:30pm-ish Wrap it Up

"I meet with the assistants and we set up irrigation. When I return to the shop, I wrap up any calls or emails that are hanging and end my day with another meeting with staff.
Our mechanics usually have everything
ready for the next day, so our team is ready to
wake up the course tomorrow."

"In 12 hours, our team has taken care of an 18 hole golf course, six chipping greens, two full ranges, one organic garden, and everything green on a 2,000 acre estate. I have a 250-acre cubicle at Rich Harvest Farms and I couldn't ask for a better place to spend my time. Yeah, it's really special here."



Mistwood Golf Club Breaks Ground

istwood Golf Club in Romeoville has gone through a major face-lift over the last two seasons, which included a renovated golf course drawing national acclaim and a new Performance Center that was immediately proclaimed among the best in the country

Next on owner Jim McWethy's to-do list is a new clubhouse. Work, which began in August with the demolition of the previous building, is well underway and the new version, designed by Chicago-based Daniel Wohlfeil Design, is expected to open next June.

"It's going to be spectacular," said McWethy, who has owned the facility since 2003 after being one of the original investors when the course opened in 1998. "Almost nothing will be as innovative, creative, and attractive as this will be." The new facility will actually consist of two buildings that will have the same stone architecture and Scottish farmhouse theme as the Performance Center, which was also designed by Wohlfeil. Together, the three buildings and surrounding landscape will have the look and feel of a Scottish village.

One building will house a restaurant and banquet facility that will easily seat 250 to 300 diners. The restaurant, still unnamed, will be

separately branded. "We want a place where people who might not even be golfers can come and have a great meal," said McWethy. The other building will have two stories, the lower one housing a pro shop and locker rooms that will accommodate 80 to 100 players and the upper one used for staff offices with a special view of the entire course. The buildings will also share a large underground basement area used for storage and golf carts. Though he's consistently declined comment on the cost of his Mistwood projects, McWethy admitted, "it's obviously very significant."

Presently, Mistwood's biggest event is the Illinois Women's Open tourney where professionals and amateurs from the U.S. and around the world compete. Mistwood has also hosted Chicago District Golf Association and Illinois PGA major events. "We definitely want more," said McWethy. "We'd love to have more national amateur and professional events, for both men and women." McWethy admits that his extensive, expensive projects fly in the face of a difficult economic climate. "The economy has been struggling, and golf is an activity that is being challenged," he said. "But, it goes back to my fundamental belief that if you do a good job with every aspect

of it, there's still enough business out there. There's still a lot of people playing golf."

And many of them are likely to visit Mistwood. More have already come – and many from further distances – to experience the renovated course and spiffy Performance Center. The new clubhouse will only add to that, and McWethy expects Mistwood to eventually become a golf destination.

"You need to build a great golf course, which I think we've done, and we have a Performance Center without peer," he said. "The clubhouse facility is the third piece of the puzzle and I believe we will have one of the finest golf facilities in the Chicago area."

The course, originally designed by Michigan architect Ray Hearn, opened in 1998. Hearn returned to handle the renovation, which required the course to be closed for parts of 2012 and 2013. That inconvenience paid off when *Golf Digest* named Mistwood as one of its Best New Courses in 2013 and *Golf* magazine listed it as one of the Best Renovations You Can Play in January, 2014, and one of its top Renovations of the Year in the world six months later.

 Readers of this publication have become quite familiar with the outstanding golf experiences across all of Northern Michigan, including the likes of Treetops Resort in Gaylord; Shanty Creek Resort in Bellaire; and Crystal Mountain in Thompsonville. But wine-loving golf enthusiasts will be genuinely surprised and delighted to discover the quality and diversity that comes out of Old Mission Point Peninsula, a short drive from the bustling community of Traverse City.

Anyone who's assumed that California is the standard for spectacular wines from the U.S. may reconsider that classification following a visit to just a handful of the eight wineries that rest on Michigan's 45th parallel. Also known as Traverse City's Wine Trail, these fascinating and elegant vineyards have been producing outstanding dry whites, dry reds, cherry wines, and rosé wines for decades.

While Midwesterners' golf opportunities are limited to a scant seven months, the pursuit of a great Michigan vintage is year 'round. The best time to visit, perhaps, is near the end of the grape-growing season in late summer and early fall when vines are weighed down with ripe fruit. But the vineyards across the

peninsula schedule fun activities across all seasons. One of the biggest events held here is the "Mac & Cheese Bake-Off" on November 29, when America's favorite comfort food receives an upgrade at the hands of Northern Michigan chefs. Each dish is expertly paired with an Old Mission Peninsula wine. Tickets sell out almost immediately upon release. Many of these events are geared towards the entire family along with couples and groups.

I recently visited six of the peninsula's eight wineries:

2 Lads The northernmost winery on the peninsula produced a superb 2012 sparkling pinot grigio that can be paired with most any dish. The winery uses the traditional champagne method to make its sparkling wines, so that small, elegant bubbles are created right inside the bottle. For my taste, 2 Lads makes the best sparkling pinot grigio produced on the peninsula.

In a nod to the trendy, the 2013 Cabernet Franc Rosé is light and fun.

Chestnuts from trees on the property provide a complementary taste treat at wine tastings.

Black Star Farms Like the majority of the wineries on the peninsula, Black Star's best-selling varietal is the ever-popular Riesling.

Their winemaking approach is much like the quintessential style of that grape found in Germany and Austria. The 45th parallel that encircles the globe midway between the equator and the North Pole provides the perfect growing climate for the Riesling grape.

Another Black Star Farms offering, the Arcturos Sur Lie Chardonnay provides the perfect taste balance between buttery and fruity.

Bowers Harbor Perhaps the most complex wines produced on the peninsula are found in the vineyards on Bowers Harbor. Although most of this region is renowned for its whites, a few standouts such as Bowers Harbor have been acclaimed for reds as well. The 2012 Cabernet Franc is excellent now, but will become fabulous in 10 to 12 years. The 2012 Langley red, kept in French-oak barrels for 18 months, is available in small quantities.

Conveniently, many of the Bowers Harbor wines can be found at Whole Foods across the Chicagoland area.

Brys Estate Vineyard and Winery Looking for an elegant and state-of-the-art tasting experience? The Brys Estate Vineyard is the place to find it. A newly-built deck overlooking the vineyards features delectable smoked gouda, prosciutto, and dry salami served on cheese and charcuterie boards. Wine enthusiasts will swoon inside the swank Brys Estate tasting room.

Chanteau Chantal Experience Bed and Breakfast at its best at this 65-acre estate overlooking East and West Grand Traverse Bay. Stunning views at morning's earliest light are complemented by soft-jazz sunset concerts. Chanteau Chantal is open year 'round for wine tasting and overnight stays.

Chateau Grand Traverse This spectacular vineyard, celebrating 40 years, today produces 1.32 million bottles of wine per year across its 120-acre estate. The property's best-selling wine is the Dry Riesling, which is complex and surprisingly affordable [\$13]. This wine won a Gold Medal from San Francisco and Riverside in 2013

The 2013 Lot 49 Riesling is one of the most unique wines produced in the peninsula, and is made from hand-picked grapes. Only a few hundred cases are made annually.

Mention golf and the Sonoran desert, and players immediately envision a towering saguaro cactus reaching for the sunshine, while the desert floor painted in rich greens takes golfers on a step-stone journey. For Chicago's snowbirds, the mild winter season in Arizona is one of the reasons to own a traveling bag for your golf clubs.

This is *the* destination for golfers. Flights from Chicago's airports are usually direct, and that translates into an "off the tarmac" round soon after you sign for that rental car.

If you spend a little time on the practice green, you'll quickly discover that one of the fastest-growing states is filling with former Chicagoans that voted with their feet against snowplows and window-scraping and have relocated to the desert.

The golf courses of Arizona are not unlike the Sonoran Desert; despite a harsh climate, abundant wildlife and native plants thrive in this environment. As do the golf courses and resorts.

SCOTTSDALE RANKED AMONG NATION'S PREMIER GOLF DESTINATIONS

One can imagine that a number of fellow soldiers thought U.S. Army Chaplain Winfield Scott had misplaced his marbles when he purchased 640 acres of Arizona property back in 1888. Even if the asking price of \$3.50 per acre seemed reasonable, the land was located in the Sonoran Desert where the primary residents at the time were lizards, scorpions, and diamondback rattlesnakes.

Six years later, the town of Scottsdale was named after its founder. By 1910, railroad-roadbed contractor William J. Murphy sized up the potential to make the budding community into a tourist destination. He proceeded to build an elegant resort named the Ingleside Club. In a true stroke of genius, Murphy determined that golf would be one of the amenities offered at the property. Following Murphy's death, his son Ralph relocated part of the resort and built a full-sized grass golf course to replace his father's sand course. Parts of that course continue to exist almost 100 years later at what is now called Arizona Country Club.

If only Winfield Scott and the two Murphy's were around today to witness the results of their visionary efforts. Scottsdale is now home to 250,000 residents and nearly 200 golf courses. Many Chicagoans, of course, have witnessed the evolution of Scottsdale into a premier golf destination as generations have flocked to the area as either a second residence or as a winter getaway. Since the golf boom, they have been treated to celebrated designs by Coore/Crenshaw, Tom Weiskopf, Pete Dye, Jack

Nicklaus and Rees Jones. Most national golf magazines place at least six of the area's layouts on their list of top 100 public golf courses in the nation.



HIGH DEFINITION GOLF AT VERRADO GOLF CLUB

Over ten years ago, DMB, Inc. unveiled what has become, the wildly successful master planned community of Verrado. Set on just over 8,800 acres once used as the Caterpillar proving grounds, DMB, Inc gave carte blanch to Tom Lehamn and John Fought toward creating what is now one of Phoenix's premier golf destinations.

Shortly after debuting in January, 2004, *GolfWeek* awarded the Verrado Golf Club with "America's Best tips, Verrado plays to nearly 7,300 yards giving even the most accomplished player a thrilling test of golf. Claiming all holes are worthy of the ever popular "signature hole" Verrado is without only one, instead choosing to highlight four of the best.

If you like downhill par 3s,

If you had to pick just one, hole #13 a short par 4 dead uphill, would be the one. Only 310 yards sounds like a walk in the park, but not here. Hit a middle iron off the tee and error long on your approach shot for the best chance at par. With only two possible pin placements, this tiny green slops back to front on both tiers. Good luck!



495-yard hole just might be the best in Arizona! Playing down hill and downwind this hole provides a great view of the clubhouse, and the entire valley beyond. After successfully navigating the fairway bunkers, one is faced with another downhill shot to a well protected green.

When you think of the ultimate Arizona golf experience, what comes to mind? Is it the stunning scenery, on-course and off? The glorious mountain vistas in every direction? Do you envision gently rolling fairways ribboning through a lush desert landscape.

Peaks to the northeast and Red Mountain to the south, or the McDowell Mountains to the west."



"The variety that the Cholla Course provides is remarkable," says Barr. "The teeth of the course are its collection of par 4s. We've got a number of holes that will demand the biggest and best from scratch players, such as the fourth, which runs about 470 yards and the sixth which checks in around 435 to 440. Number 16 is another stout


slender and ample fairways, and a balance of benign and rugged green complexes. The long and strong will challenge all of Cholla's 7,225 yards, but well-spaced multiple tee boxes allow every type of player to enjoy the course, especially from the friendly front tees, which measure 5,289 yards.

The noted golf course architectural team of Bill Coore and Ben Crenshaw designed We-Ko-Pa's second 18, the award-winning Saguaro Golf Course. Open since December 2006, Saguaro has design elements not commonly found in the desert Southwest. Saguaro is much like the older more traditional courses found on the east coast, where greens are close to tees and the course follows the natural movement of the land making walking easy and enjoyable.

In Saguaro, Coore and Crenshaw re-introduced the



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





Tony Rosa did not want to write another teen novel. Convinced he had nothing more to say about golf, Rosa swore that *Birdie* was his last effort for young readers. Which, had his proclamation held true, would have been a shame after his efforts with Two for Tee, The Schoolboy, and Birdie. Rosa's realistic fiction, intermingled life lessons with golf and teenage angst, takes readers beyond golf analogies to believable conflicts. His stories may not be well known among golf literature aficionados, but they should be.

Rosa's latest effort, The President's Caddy, is part fiction and part autobiography. Rosa admits that it is, "Kind of an oxymoron isn't it?" He did caddie for President Gerald Ford in 1978, and there are a few parallel events in *The President's Caddy*. Rosa's protagonist is a sixteen-year-old caddy who continues to learn a few of life's lessons the hard way. The genius of Rosa is that his characters do not lean on mystical encounters or journeys of self-awareness. The plot is how, by sheer luck, a teenager can land a gig carrying the president's golf bag after committing a 'Big Goof' and falling on his face.

The President's Caddy is an engaging tale that teaches that soft skills will carry a young man far in life. For the sake of young readers, let's hope Rosa continues to write for teenagers and provide realistic heroes who are accountable for their actions and prepared for success.





eaune, France, may be the wine capital of the Côte D'Or, if not all of Burgundy. It is home to important vineyards, as well as influential wine merchants, or négociants.

One of the oldest of these is Domaine Chanson, founded in 1750. Chanson's holdings comprise some of Burgundy's most coveted vineyards (over 94 acres, 17 in white, the rest in red), including 10 Premier Crus and one Grand Cru.

In 1777, Chanson bought the cellars they still occupy today. To store the 100,000 bottles then in inventory, in 1794 they acquired the large round Bastion de l'Oratoire. The bastion is a massive 15th-century fortress and an internationally celebrated icon of Burgundy.

Chanson still vinifies and cellars its wines in the bastion as it has for over 200 years. The 30-foot-thick walls of this ancient fortress make it ideal for winemaking. While the ground floor (the coolest) serves as a vinothèque or "vintage wine library," vinification and cask-aging take place on the second and third floors.

The bastion holds Chanson's approximately 3,000 barrels of wine. The proportions of new oak are roughly 25% for whites and 30 to 35% for the reds.

"The temperature of the bastion never varies," explains Chanson general manager Gilles de Courcel. "It is ideal for cold maceration of the bunches. In the springtime, we might open one of the cellar doors to allow the warm air in. We never accelerate malolactic fermentation. We allow it to occur spontaneously and naturally. We use only the best cuvées and we never hurry the process. This is how we maintain the freshness, purity, and fragrance of the wines."

2010 Clos des Mouches

This chardonnay is classified as a Premier Cru, Burgundy's second highest ranking. The grapes came from a mere 4.9 acres of difficult soil mixed with limestone, clay, and silica.

Although this pale gold wine spent 14 months in French oak, both on the nose and palate the wood is delicate and restrained. Aromas and tastes of citrus fruit predominate, with a hint of spice on the long finish. This is a white that needs to breathe for at least 30 minutes.

The generous acidity makes this an excellent food wine. Fish Filets Poached in White Wine and a Julienen of Vegetables, Fresh Shucked Oysters, or Chicken Fricassee would all pair well.

2010 Clos Des Fèves

Clos loosely translates as "enclosed vineyard." Clos des Fèves is a rare 'monopole' Premier Cru vineyard, where the entire vineyard is owned by a single grower. This 9.4-acre site is one of the highest in Beaune, with an unforgiving soil of clay and limestone.

This Pinot Noir is a transparent ruby in the glass, with aromas of blackberry and plum. After an hour in the air, the wine comes alive with the flavors of the fruit (although as the French prefer, not fruit-forward) and the elegant tannins. The finish is quite long for a Pinot Noir. Excellent now, this wine will probably be better in five years.

This wine calls for classic dishes such as Steak au Poivre, Boeuf Bourguignon, Cassoulet, or Rôti de Porc Grand' Mère.



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Tour Notes and Reflections

FROM THE **FRINGE** Insights on the **PGA Tour**



hat a year it's been in the world of pro golf. The inaugural "wraparound" PGA Tour season that began last October finally, mercifully, concluded on August 17 at the Wyndham Championship, ending a strange regular season on the PGA Tour.

An astounding 34 different men won tournaments this year, and none with the last name of Woods or Mickelson. Only six players won multiple times, with Rory McIlroy saving everyone a headache in Player of the Year voting by capturing two majors.

On the women's side, Michelle Wie "finally" won a major at the ripe old age of 24, giving American women victories in three of the four major championships played by press time. The last time three different American women won majors in a year? You have to go back to 1997 with Betsy King (Kraft Nabisco), Christa Johnson (LPGA Championship), and Colleen Walker (du Maurier Classic).

Let's take a look at how those with deep Chicagoland ties fared:

Wilson Golf celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2014, with Winfield-native Kevin Streelman marking the centennial with a record-breaking victory at the Travelers Championship earlier in the year.

The victory catapulted Streelman to one of his best seasons on the PGA Tour. At press time he's the 43rd-ranked player in the world, and entered the FedEx Cup Playoffs at No. 39 (through the Wyndham Championship).

He told GOLFChicago last year he saved his first Masters invitation and the note from Arnold Palmer congratulating him on his first victory, but I wanted to know what happened to the sticks he used to set a PGA Tour record seven-straight birdies back in June.

Did he retire some wedges, or put 'em in a glass case?

"You know, we had a charity coming up in Raleigh [North Carolina] and I was going to put my tour bag up that I used for the win, and get it signed by a bunch of pro's, and I was like, oh, I think I might hold on to it," Streelman said with a laugh. "Certain things like that—I might hold on to the irons and the bag I used for that record. It's something I won't forget."

Around the Tours

Streelman's win highlighted the year for Chicagoarea players in an unusually pedestrian season by the group. The University of Illinois contingent had an OK season as a whole. Two-time tour winner D.A. Points contended early at the Wyndham and finished a season-best tied for 18th, but struggled for most of the season. In his fourth season as a pro, Scott Langley was

also atop that Wyndham leaderboard before finishing 12th. He only had one top 10 in the year, but advanced into the playoffs.

In his third year as a touring pro, Luke Guthrie finished with two top 10s and also made the playoffs. Finally, the Illinois Godfather—Steve Stricker—flirted with another major at the PGA Championship and secured a vice captaincy at the Ryder Cup under Tom Watson.

Former world No. 1 Luke Donald had a very quiet year, missing cuts at The Masters and U.S. Open and not factoring into the equation at the British Open and PGA Championship. He finished second at the RBC Heritage back in April.

Elmhurst's Mark Wilson, a five-time winner on the Tour, struggled in the 2013-14 wraparound season, missing 16 cuts in 25 events with his best finish coming in May at the Wells Fargo Championship (tie 24).

Venturing farther north, former Western Open champ and Madison, Wisconsin, native Jerry Kelly enjoyed a bounceback year, getting into the FedEx Cup playoffs with two third-place finishes and four top 10s.

The locals fared better on the Champions Tour, with Hinsdale's Jeff Sluman leading the way with a victory at the Big Cedar Lodge Legends of Golf in June, and six other top 10 finishes to rank fifth in the Charles Schwab Cup ranking at press time. Berwyn native Gary Hallberg continued his good play with a top 10 and two top 25s as well.

I remember, clearly, the 2009 Solheim Cup at Rich Harvest Farms in Sugar Grove. The United States beat Europe 16-12 behind a controversial captain's pick named Michelle Wie, and it sticks with me to this day because of the incredible golf and experience, one that the Ryder Cup at Medinah could only match (yes, match, not surpass).

I think about it as Rich Harvest is gearing up to host another women's team event, the International Crown, in 2016. Spain won the inaugural event this July in Maryland beating Sweden by four. The U.S. finished a distant sixth.

The result matters little. What matters is that this entire event can be traced back to Jerry Rich's desire to bring the LPGA back to his course, back to the Chicagoland area and Illinois.

In an era of major golf leaving Chicago, we're again gearing up for something big. More than that, though, the creation of this much-needed global event could be the crowning achievement for Rich, who has long been a benefactor of the Western Golf Association and amateur golf.


